From 1816 to 1830 Abraham Lincoln grew into adulthood near Little Pigeon Creek, Indiana. During these years he witnessed the loss of his mother and sister, as well as many of his relatives and close friends, to the calamities of frontier existence--childbirth, the "milk sick," and simple malnutrition. Scorned by an insensitive father, heartbroken by a tragic love affair, and in constant trouble with the community, he became preoccupied with his physical unattractiveness and immersed in a bitter melancholy which would characterize him for the rest of his life.

It was during this period, however, that he also developed those legendary qualities by which we remember and revere the Abraham Lincoln story--his warm humor, his love of reading and culture, his remarkable powers of communication, and his intense compassion for all living things. The spiritual and moral evolution of this complex, often contradictory, even paradoxical man is the subject of William Wilson's family drama Abe Lincoln of Pigeon Creek.

Presented as the family production for San Jose State University's celebration of Theatre Americana, Abe Lincoln of Pigeon Creek is designed for audiences of ages 10 to 100. Employing 16mm film, slides, kinesis effects, and highly theatricalized sound and lighting, the production focuses on the conflicts and traumas of adolescence. The action is psychological, and though the play is concerned with the visible confrontations between young Abe and his family, friends and sweetheart, the primary struggle occurs within the extraordinary mind of Lincoln himself.

The play climaxes when Abe is banished from his community as a troublemaker and sent downriver to New Orleans. Abe begins this journey determined to find employment as a riverboat pilot. Instead he finds something which will radically alter the course of his life--slavery.
