Karleen Pendleton Jiménez is a writer and teacher living in Toronto, Canada. She recently co-edited the anthology Unleashing the Unpopular: Talking about Sexual Orientation and Gender Diversity in Education.

Her short stories have been published in numerous anthologies and magazines, including most recently, Geeks, Misfits and Outlaws and Jota! (2003), Bent on writing and Fireweed (2002), Fantasmas (2001), and Pillow Talk II (2000). Her children's book Are You a Boy or a Girl? was a finalist for a 2001 Lambda Literary Award. She is currently teaching education at Trent University. Scriptwriter Karleen Pendleton Jiménez was shortlisted for a U.S. Lambda Award for the original book Are You a Boy or a Girl? Tomboy has received the CBC Canadian Reflections Award, Jury Award for Best Animation at the Chicago Reeling Festival, and Best of Festival at the Austin Women's Film and Literary Festival. Filmmaker Barb Taylor received the Jury Award



for Up and Coming Toronto Film Maker at the Inside Out Film Festival 2008.
