Suzzalo Makes Report **On Regional Colleges**

Speaking of the recommendations of the Carnegie Foundation report made by Henry Suzzalo, famous alumnus of San Jose State. Dr. T. W. MacOuarrie said, "Some institution has to develop undergraduate work to meet modern conditions, and San Jose State might as well fill that need."

The report advises keeping the regional State Colleges on their present basis without any exten-sion into the University field. Insolution the university field, in-cluded with this recommendation was the proposal that these schools be put under the Board of Regents at the University of California.

At present San Jose State is un-At present san Jose state is un-der the jurisdiction of the State Board of Education, and under the suggested change would be under the control of a non-political board composed of members appointed for a term of sixteen ars
