TICKETS GO ON SALE AT \$1.95 FOR COMBINED TRIP AND MEAL

Leon Warmke has just received a letter from Hod Bailey, the chairman of the rally committee for the College of the Pacific. The College of the Pacific has offered to see that all students taking the trip on the train from San Jose to Pacific have means of transportation from the depot to the Pacific dining hall. This will mean a saving of ten cents on the fare. Five cents of this will be added to the dinner and five cents will be subtracted from the original \$2.00 price of the ticket. The new price of the tickets will be \$1.95, and all students who have already paid \$2.00 will receive a refund of five cents from the salesman who sold the ticket.

Pacific is also giving a special dance in honor of San Jose State and the teams after the game. In order to provide transportation home for those students wishing to stay to the dance the committee has arranged for the train tickets to include stop over privileges until Sunday night. This dance will have an admittance charge of ten cents with student body cards.

The committee wishes to announce that all students going to Pacific in private cars instead of on the train will be given the dinner in the Pacific dining hall for the insignificant price of 25 cents. Spartans Are Only F.W.C. Team to Win in Practice Games

PACIFIC LOSES TO LEGION; MENLO J. C. BEATS CHICO STATE

San Jose State 19, S. F. State 0.
Menlo J. C. 12, Chico State 6.
St. Mary's 35, Nevada 0.

Such were the game scores of teams composing the Far Western Conference. All going to show that with the exception of the Spartans the Conference representatives didn't fare so well.

In defeating the San Francisco State Beachcombers 19 to 0, San Jose State lived up to all expectations—except to those who thought State would run up a bigger score. The scoring was held down considerably by the constant running in of substitutes. Every man on the squad was given a chance in the game. The Spartans used but six plays.

Nevada's 35 to 0 defeat at the hands of St. Mary's means absolutely nothing as far as the Far Western Conference teams are concerned. Nevada nor any other team in the Conference can be compared with the Galloping Gaels, strong contenders for the National Championship this year. In holding the Gaels scoreless in the second half the Wolfpack showed a powerful line.

In a close game the Chico Staters lost to Menlo Junior College, 12 to 6. After playing a scoreless first half the Chico boys scored early in the third quarter. Menlo scored both their touchdowns in the last quarter.

Down in the valley the Fresno State Bulldogs lost a tough game to the West Coast Army, 7 to 6. Army outplayed the Bulldogs in every department of the game, displaying a fast passing attack that threatened to increase the score time and again. The Bulldogs showed a staunch goal line defense when they held the Jarheads for four downs on the three yard line. Fresno's score came in the closing minutes of the game when Captain Walt Glenn intercepted an Army pass and ran it back 40 yards to about the 15 yard line. Rambo went over for the score.

Pacific, playing on an even basis with the powerful American Legion team, dropped a close 7 to 6 verdict. Holding aggressive players such as Soloon, former U. C. L. A. captain, Bill Hardiman and Robinson at an even basis throughout the game indicates the power of the Pacific Tigers. Both team's scores were made on passes. A flat running pass, Wickersham to Hamilton, was responsible for the Pacific touchdown.

Negotiations are already under way for McGill and Linn to present one of the magical performances in the Little Theatre under the sponsorship of the State College student body, October 6th, at 8 o'clock.

Noticed at Ewing:—

San Jose State need take no back talk from any member of the Conference in the matter of ends. Hubbard and Baracchi demonstrated Saturday that they are as good wingmen as any coach need ask for. Hubbard threw the Beachcombers for losses repeatedly and they both hounded the passers to the extent that Spartan backs intercepted five of the City lad's eighteen tosses. Laughlin and Francis are not far behind these two, and, in addition, pack more beef, which is an asset when the going is tough. State is safe at the ends.

The San Francisco game demonstrated that Freddie Bennett has by no means cinched that left halfback job on the varsity. Sammy Filice, who replaced Bennett in the second period, gained more yards from scrimmage than any man except Jack Wool. Filice reeled off a total of 38 yards against Bennett's 26. Embury, who came in for Filice, showed by his sensational punting that State will not have to depend solely on Jack Wool in this department. Embury got his kicks away many times when it appeared certain that they would be blocked. He sent one sailing over the S. F. safetyman's head and another one out on the two yard marker. He also looked good as a ball packer and safetyman.

The list of unavailable and ineligible football players attending San Jose State is filled with distinguished names who deserve mention even though the varsity seems to be progressing nicely without their aid. For instance, there are a couple of backfield aces who, being ineligible through having attended another four-year institution, have volunteered their services as assistants to Freshman Coach Erwin Blesh. They are "Toby" McLachlan, of Menlo J. C. and Oregon State, and Dud Shaw, of Santa Ana J. C., and the same Northern institution. It might be appropriate to mention here that Hal DeFraga, of last year's varsity, is also assisting Blesh with the yearlings. In addition to the above, there is Alfred Azevedo, an experienced tackle from Oakland, who packs a mere 220 pounds around on his frame.

Dopester Has Tough Time Picking Teams In Week-end Games

SAN JOSE-PACIFIC GAME IS RATED AS A TOSS-UP; STANFORD TO WIN

This week Santa Clara is just another football team. Rated as heavy favorites to take the Oregon eleven into camp, the Broncos had the tables reversed on them and came back to the Mission town on the short end of the 7-0 score.

Stanford, on the other hand, had the sympathy of every grid follower on the coast at the opening of the season, but displayed every football asset in the book to trounce Oregon State by a 27-0 score.

California was smiled upon by Dame Fortune and came through in the final five minutes of play to break a 6-6 tie and win from the Olympic Club by a 22-6 score. The Bears may end in the money yet, but they looked ragged again Saturday.

St. Mary's stamped itself as a heavy favorite to beat the Bears, by defeating the University of Nevada by a 35-0 score. It was certainly rough treatment for Coach "Brick" Mitchell, who is in his first year at Nevada.

Southern California trounced Washington State College, 20-0, but the Cougars looked good in taking their defeat. The Trojans are a good team to string with until they are beaten, however.

Picking winners this week is a tough one, especially when we have to start right off at home with the Pacific-San Jose game. Taking into consideration that the Tigers have a veteran team, an extra practice game under their belts, can use frosh on the squad, and that the contest will be played in the Pacific backyard under their own lights, the Tigers are favored to win. But I would like to be wrong on this one. The winner of Friday's game between these two teams can easily be stamped as the leading eleven for the conference race this year.

Again I hold my breath. Favor Stanford to beat Santa Clara. (Now I have to keep out of Mat Susanj's sight.)

No sentiment is involved in the other games, so I don't have to cross my fingers. Here they are: St. Mary's over California.

DE GROOT PLEASD WITH TEAM'S SHOWING IN GAME

"They played a good game Saturday, although they showed all the weaknesses of a team playing their first game under a new system," said Head Coach Dud De Groot. "I am fully satisfied with the showing of every man on the squad."

With this statement about last Saturday's game with San Francisco State Teachers College, De Groot turns to the difficult task of strengthening all weaknesses and having the squad in shape for their opening Far Western Conference game with College of Pacific Friday night.

Pacific are favorites no matter how you look at it. With fast, heavy, deceptive backs behind a line that outweighs the Spartan line by at least 10 pounds per man, it is impossible to give the edge to anybody but Pacific. From what they showed against the American Legion eleven last Saturday they look to be the team to beat in the Conference.

About "Swede" Righter's Pacific Tigers DeGroot says, "Will Hubbard and I scouted the Tigers in their game with the American Legion outfit Saturday. They looked plenty tough, featuring a line that weighs 200 pounds from tackle to tackle and a lightning fast backfield."

DeGroot and Pope Illia are spending a good deal of time on the linemen this week. Pacific's backfield specializes on a running right formation. From their running right formation they have the choice of three plays. They can sweep around the end, they can cut inside tackle or end, or they can shoot a short running pass. This running attack baffled the experienced Legion linemen time and again last Saturday. The Spartan linemen will have to play heads-up, aggressive football to ston the Bengals.

Hubbard and DeGroot are trying hard to develop a much stronger pass defense than was shown in the S. F. State game. Flat, short passes from Wickersham to Hamilton is one of the strong points in Pacific's offense. This short pass was responsible for the Tiger's touchdown scored on the Legion.

Walker's Varsity Men Improve With Nightly Scrimmages

NEW PLAYERS AID COACH IN BUILDING STRONG FIRST TEAM

Coach Walker and his men are pointing to the California game this Saturday at Berkeley with high spirits and new confidence. The discovery of several promising players has done its share in creating this new attitude.

At the beginning of the season, Coach Walker was minus a competent goalie. Today, Sophomore Holbert, although inexperienced in varsity competition, looms as the man to beat for that position. Holbert, a long, lanky fellow, kicks well and handles himself coolly in defense.

For the first time since he has coached soccer, Walker now has two complete teams scrimmaging every night. Under the test of competition, the varsity squad is showing more rapid improvement than at this time last year, when the first string was compelled to scrimmage with four or five substitutes.

Wayne Greenfield, another new man eligible for varsity competition, has shown excellent form at right inside. He plays a clever game, and should prove an outstanding player this year.

The right wing position has been only taken care of by Herman Wittenberg, whose playing has been one of the bright spots of the nightly scrimmages. His accurate kicking to the goal should result in many scores this year.

As the squad shapes up now, State seems destined to go much farther in the California Intercollegiate Soccer Conference this year than last. The players are more experienced, more men have signed up, and every one is facing the season with that necessary confidence.

Both the State and Pacific team are in perfect physical condition. The State squad came out of the S. F. game without any injuries. "Eastey" Easterbrook, 200 pound Bengal fullback who wasn't in uniform last week will be ready for the State game. It is rumored that Righter has been keeping Easterbrook especially for the State game.

DeGroot and the Spartan team are getting a tough break having to play their "Big Game" so early in the season. Another bad break is that the game is to be played at night under the weak Mazda's at Stockton stadium. To many of the boys playing under the lamps will be a new experience.

Regardless of the bad breaks, DeGroot is still wearing a smile and feels that his men have a good chance of dumping the highly touted Tigers.
