COACH DEGROOT CONFIDENT THAT SAN JOSE HAS FIGHTING CHANCE

A snarling, snapping Bulldog comes to town today in an effort to knock Coach Dud DeGroot's Spartans off the peak to which they have risen by virtue of wins over Pacific and Sacramento. Today's battle is a "croocial" struggle for both teams concerned. If San Jose comes out on top, they will have surmounted one of the greatest obstacles in their path to the Far Western Conference championship. On the other hand, if Fresno wins they will be very much back in the conference race, whereas, if they lose, they will be quite definitely out of it.

Smarting from their 3-0 defeat at the hands of the Cal Aggies two weeks ago, Coach Stan Borleske's charges are out for blood today. Boasting a line which averages 202 pounds from tackle to tackle, a set of fast, hard-hitting backs, and a punter who is classed with the best on the coast, the Bulldogs stand more than an even chance of dumping the Spartans.

WINTER RAINS WILL SETTLE EMBANKMENT FOR SPRING WORK

As the Times goes to press, word comes from the President's office that Michael Antonacci, City Planning engineer and co-designer of the Stanford stadium, has been ordered to draw up plans for the dimensions, location, and financing of the new Spartan stadium, to be started at Christmas.

Dr. MacQuarrie stated to the Times:

"Instructions have been given to the architect to complete specifications for the earth embankment and to get costs, and to secure bids.

"I think this a most favorable time for building as prices are low. We have enough funds to finance the earth embankment.

"We hope to be able to start work directly after Christmas as it is advantageous to let the winter rains settle the embankment."

Injuries May Slow Up Spartan Attack in Today's Contest

SNARLING, SNAPPING DOG PACK WILL ATTEMPT TO WIN

A powerful mass of charging beef averaging 200 pounds from tackle to tackle flanked by a pair of last ends, followed by a backfield considered as being one of the best in the Far Western Conference, will test the strength of Dud DeGroot's Spartan gridiron aspirants this afternoon on Spartan field at 3:00 o'clock.

On paper, Fresno looks like a world-beater, but the question is whether or not they can live up to their reputation when put to the acid test. They have a last year's all-conference man and boast several more for this year's team. I have my doubts as to how these men will show up this afternoon. They are given an even break with San Jose, and what a game this is going to be.

Captain Walt Glenn and Coach Borleske have fired the Bulldog team to a point of great fighting spirit. They realize their ship is practically sunk if they don't take the Spartans into camp, and this they certainly intend to do.

They will probably have the advantage in the kicking as they have Mathiesen, who is considered as being one of the best punters on the Pacific Coast, and in addition to this he is a great ball packer and blocker. Captain Glenn, although the lightest man on the squad, is a crafty field general and a dangerous left-handed passer.

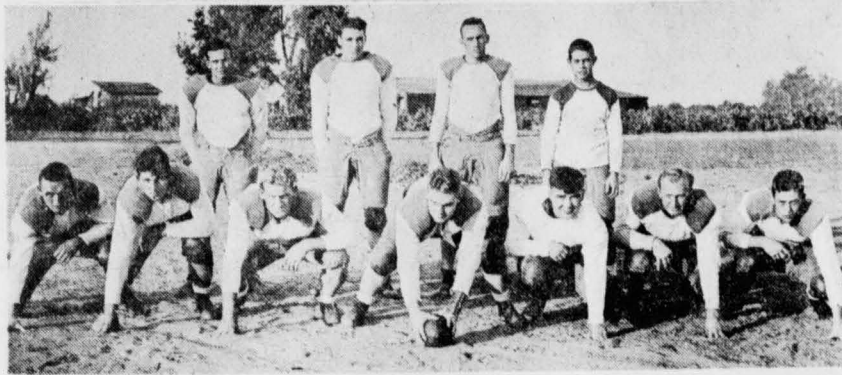
Smiling Jack Horner, fullback, is the powerhouse type of a crashing back and is touted as quite a threat to any team. The fourth man to bolster the Bulldog backfield will be Jiggs Payne. He is a new man in the raisin institution, and though injured early in the season is now ready to show the fans why he has been named the fastest man on the team.

Winslow Wickstrom and Frank Schleibaum are both fast, heavy ends, whose specialty is dumping the opponent's safety man. They have a great chance to do this as the punts are high and they have time to get under the ball about the time it comes down. They are also dependable pass receivers and are being talked up as all-conference ends, and what they do in this game will have a lot to do with the outcome.

The nucleus of the line is made up of Niswander, center, and Feichtmeir and Shimmin, guards. Feichtmeir, all-conference guard last year, and is in line to retain the distinction again. At tackle we find Kaufman and Lewis. Both are veterans and spend a great deal of their time in the opponents backfield, but they are liable to have their minds changed this afternoon if I know anything about the system which DeGroot is planning to use.

No matter who wins, this is going to be a great game, one which you can't afford to miss. It will have a definite bearing on the outcome of the Far Western con-

Sammy Filice, who has been hampered by an ankle injury for two weeks, reinjured that member in the same Wednesday scrimmage, which further weakens the left halfback job.

FRESHMEN SHOW POWERFUL ATTACK IN WORK-OUTS WITH VARSITY

With the ambition of making it four in a row, Erwin Blesh's football proteges will tackle the Fresno State College Frosh Saturday evening in what promises to be a hectic affair. The Fresno team have a record closely rivaling that of the local Babes, and are pushovers for no one. Coach Blesh has been putting the squad through extra hard workouts this week, especially on blocking and tackling, and from all appearances there will be a new starting line-up this week.

Schuh has been improving rapidly this week and will fill Lompa's guard berth. He is a big man with plenty of fight and will give a good account of himself while in there. McAllister has been holding down the right guard post since the start of the year, and has yet to turn in a poor performance.

Captain Watson and Ralph Bernardo are staging a close battle for the left half position. Watson is a triple threat man—kicking, passing, and carrying the ball with uncanny ability. Bernardo is as fast a man as there is on the squad.

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
