All election posters must be taken down by 6 p.m., Lloyd added.

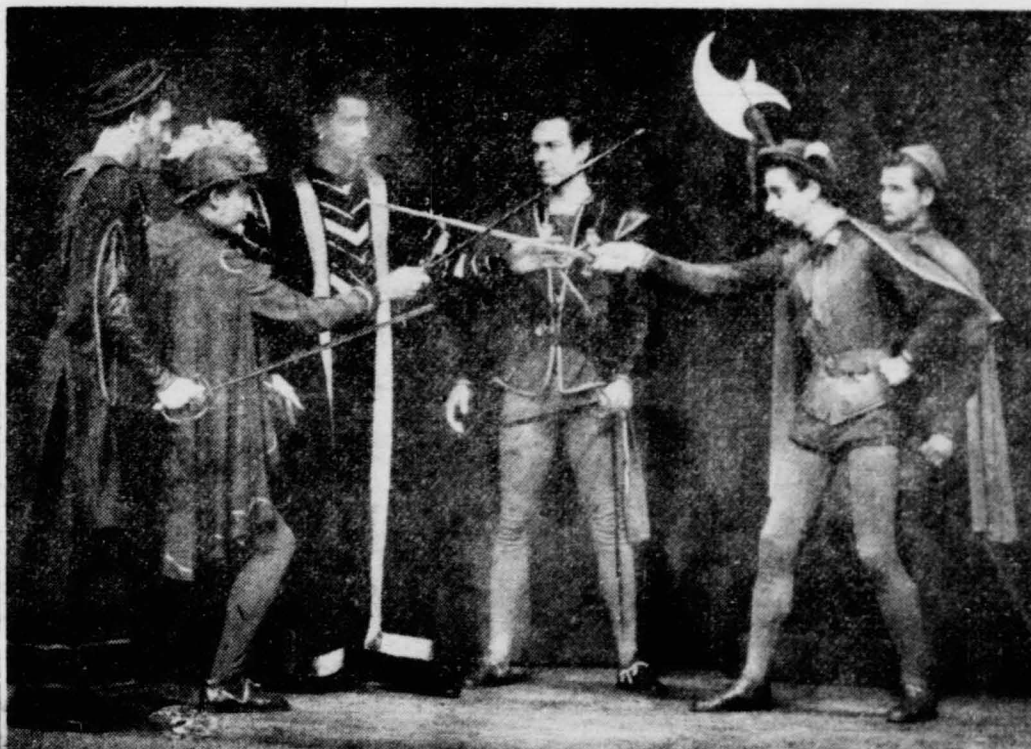

'Othello' Opens Run Tonight; Charlebois, Wegner Starred

Playgoers will hear the tragic lines of Shakespeare come to life tonight as the first performance of "Othello" is presented on the stage of the Little Theater. Curtain time is 8:15 p.m.

The elaborate production of the famous tragedy is directed by Dr. James H. Clancy, professor of speech and drama.

Jerry Charlebois, tall dark-haired freshman from Seattle, Wash., is cast in the title role of Othello, while Donna Wegner of Mountain View plays his wife, the fair Desdemona. Richard Risso portrays Iago.

Secondary roles are assigned to Dick Magary as Cassio, Tom Patterson as Roderigo, Mary Haugum as Emilia, Douglas Murray as Gratiano, William Resch as the Duke, Joe LoBue as Brabantio, Warren Blomseth as Lodovico, Sal Ferranti as Montano and Ruth Dougherty as Bianca.

Other players include Bert Graf and Jerry Huven as Venetian senators; Don Frost and Robert Dietle as sailors; William Coleman, John Roderiques and Warren Ramsey as gentlemen and Lewis Campbell, David Jen-

kinson, Jack Byers and James Bernardi as soldiers and servants.

The tragedy evolves around an imaginary "triangle" in which Othello is tricked by Iago into believing that his wife and his chief lieutenant, Cassio, are having a love affair.

Shafts of light will be used to emphasize the varying moods of the play and characters, according to J. Wendell Johnson, who designed the sets for "Othello." The difficulty of settings for the 14 scenes of the play will be surmounted by the use of three large columns which will be moved around the stage to create an illusion of time and place.

Berneice Prisk designed the 15th century Italian Renaissance wardrobe for the 23 members of the cast. The wardrobe em-

phasizes simplicity of design and dark colors.

Barbara Baumann, recent graduate and new faculty member, is the technical director. Morgan Montague is stage manager, Bruce Payne is electrician, Joan Malloy is in charge of sound effects and Joan McKibben is property manager. James Lioi constructed the sets for the play and Murel Fritz is costume assistant.

The room, which also is used for speeches, meetings and movies, was painted yellow, gray and white by Jerry Brown, college painter.

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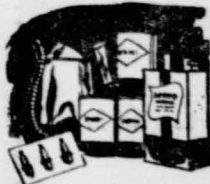
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Treasurer Asks Organization List

Biology Field Trip Nets Rare Insect

Three specimens of a relatively rare beetle, the amphizoa, were found by members of the Entomology club Sunday in the Big Basin area of the Santa Cruz mountains, according to Dr. J. Gordon Edwards, instructor in biology who accompanied the group.

The find was made during an 11-mile insect-collecting hike to Berry falls.

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'No Narcotics at SJS,' Stadium Seats, Stairs and Wall Painted Gray

"There is no traffic of narcotics at San Jose State college or at any other school in the city of San Jose."

This statement was made this week by Sgt. W. H. MacKenzie, a member of the San Jose Police department vice detail.

He added that the Special Service bureau of the police department has been "unable to locate in any shape or form any evidence of narcotics at the college."

Sgt. MacKenzie added that in the latter part of February of this year an allegation was made by a local citizen that narcotics were being used by students on the Spartan campus. He said a thorough check by the police proved conclusively there was no evidence of dope being used by the students.

He revealed the State Narcotics bureau considers the county of Santa Clara and the City of San Jose as being two of the "cleanest" spots in the state.

"The local dope situation is constant. If anything, there is a decrease in the use of narcotics in San Jose," he added.

A contributing factor to this local decrease may be the fact that Governor Earl Warren recently signed a bill which makes it a felony in California to unlawfully sell, furnish, admin-

ister, or give any narcotics to a minor.

Narcotics Commissioner Harry J. Anslinger recently said in a Washington interview, carried by Associated Press, there is no "situation" in any West Coast city.

According to the dispatch, Anslinger considers New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore, Detroit, Chicago, St. Louis and New Orleans as the danger points in the United States. He added, said the AP, that of all the states only Pennsylvania and California have adequate narcotics enforcement agencies.

Homecoming Band Chosen

Buddy King and his orchestra will provide the music for the Homecoming dance on Nov. 23, Cliff Lindsey, chairman of the social affairs committee, said yesterday.

The dance will be held in the Civic auditorium from 10 p.m. until 1 a.m., Lindsey announced. A student body card is the ticket to admission. COP students are invited to attend.

Bids still are being accepted from bands for the Winter Mist formal, slated for Dec. 1, Lindsey said. The social affairs committee is sponsoring both dances.

The seats, stairs, stair rails and retaining wall at Spartan stadium now are being painted gray, Byron Bollinger, college superintendent of grounds and buildings, said yesterday.

He stated that a prime coat of gray paint has been completed on the seats on the east side of the arena.

Mr. Bollinger added that painting temporarily was halted yesterday afternoon so that the paint would be dry for this evening's San Jose State-Loyola football game.

"Painting of the stadium will begin again Monday," he said.

The stadium scoreboard recently was repainted with black letters on a white background.

Mr. Bollinger added that the State Department of Architecture has estimated that the painting of the stadium will cost \$36,000.

Water dripped through a hole near the ventilation pipe in the fifth floor bookstacks soon after the storm began. Pans were placed under the leak to control the falling water.

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Zoology Students See Fish, Reptiles

Members of Zoology 115 and their guests took a field trip recently to the California Academy of Science, located in Golden Gate park, San Francisco. Dr. Ralph A. Smith, associate professor of zoology, was in charge of the group.

The group visited the sea lion exhibit pool, the Galapagos land tortoise room, and the Steinhart aquarium. Giant salamanders up to 69 inches long, 12 inch long African frogs, and river jack snakes were some of the other specimens observed.

The river jack is one of the deadliest serpents in the world, according to Dr. Smith. It has fangs one inch long and horns that protrude from its head.

The play was attempted and the result was a 29-yard touchdown pass play from ex-Spartan Gene Menges to Mel Light.

"Those Petalumans had a mighty low opinion of me," Bondelle commented. "I was lucky to get out of the stands alive after the game," he chuckled.

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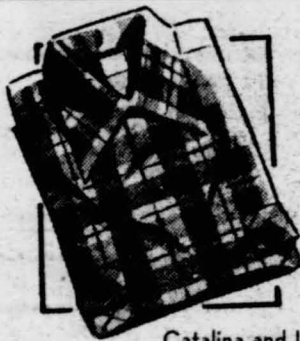

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Raiders Have to Stop Klosterman Pitches to Win

Stop Don Klosterman and you whip the Loyola Lions.

If the San Jose State Spartans can do so tonight in Spartan stadium they will beat Coach Jordan Olivar's eleven from Los Angeles.

With the nation's number one passers at the quarterback spit, Loyola is just as dangerous as Klosterman is healthy.

The Lions' 0-4 record so far isn't impressive. Nor is SJS's 1-4. But both marks might be deceiving and a wide-open game is in prospect.

Klosterman hardly has been stopped this fall if the statistics mean anything. He has thrown 164 passes and completed 81 for seven tallies. His workhorse companion is Right End Fred Snyder, who has snared 24 of his passes to complete a terrific one-two punch.

Still, Loyola hasn't developed too much of a ground game and defense to supplement the Klosterman-to-Snyder combination. Loyola is coming along and if the pitcher and catcher get some help, the Lions may roar. And don't forget, Coach Jordan Olivar's boys tallied 28 points against two strong clubs, San Diego Navy and COP.

Olivar had a powerhouse last year and the Lions captured eight out of nine games. But like Bronzan, Olivar lost some high guns via graduation. George "Socco" Mussacco, Skip Giancanelli, Neil Ferris, Gene Brito and three veteran linemen got diplomas.

Klosterman was left to direct a club loaded with sophomores and juniors. Olivar must rely more on Don's strong right arm this year, since the Lion running attack is handled by sophomores Danny Seivert, Bob Burton and Bill McKerman. High scorer Stan Zaleski, regular halfback, and end Duane DeFontes quit Olivar's squad at midweek because of scholastic difficulties.

Bronzan thinks this game will be the turning point for either outfit. If the Golden Raiders pressure Klosterman enough to triumph, they would get the "lift" needed for their remaining games with San Diego Navy, Santa Clara, COP and Marquette.

Weather permitting, QB's Jerry Hamilton and Lynn Aplanalp will challenge Klosterman in the air lanes. Archie Chagonjian, Bobby Osborne, Gibby Mendonza, Frank Morriss and Bob Sykes will do the packing.

Injury Lists

Loyola's Lions will attempt to even up their series record with SJS tonight when they take the field against the Spartans.

In the three previous games played between the Lions and the Spartans, the Los Angeles boys have won but one contest. That one victory, however, is still in the minds of many students who recall the last year's game in which big George Musacco, Lion fullback, packed the ball 45 times for 202 net yards and a 4.5 yards per carry average. The Lions won this scuffle 14 to 7.

Flingin' Don Klosterman, who will lead the Loyola squad tonight, had an off-night during the 1950 game according to his coach, Jordan Olivar.

However, dangerous Don was accurate enough to toss two touchdown passes. One of the TD passes went to Fred Snyder who also will see action tonight.

The first Lion-Spartan battle took place in Gilmore stadium in Los Angeles in 1939. The 'Pop' Warner-Dudley DeGroot coached Spartan eleven shutout the Lions 10 to 0. Guard Ken Cook booted a field goal, while halfback Herm Zetterquist raced around end on a double reverse for the game's only touchdown. Bob Bronzan, present SJS grid coach, started the game at tackle although he was entangled with yards of tape due to injuries. LeRoy Zimmerman, Spartan's All-American played his usual fine game.

In 1940 the Spartans returned to Gilmore field to trounce Loyola 27 to 12. This was the most one-sided contest in the series.

Dick Hubbell led the Golden Raiders to victory as he ran 24 yards for one TD and passed to Bud Nygren and Johnny Allen for two other scores. Halfback Aubrey Minter accounted for the fourth tally with an 80 yard kick-off return.

JV's Play Moffett Field Saturday

Making their first home appearance of the season, the SJS junior varsity football squad will tangle with the Moffett Field Navy team tomorrow afternoon at 1 p.m. in Spartan stadium.
