Judges To Pick Queen At Program Tonight

Her majesty, the Centennial Homecoming Queen, and her four maids-of-honor will be selected tonight during the fashion show in Morris Dailey Auditorium, according to Jan Heter, queen committee chairman.

Identity of the queen, however, will not be revealed until tomorrow night when she will be crowned at the Coronation Ball, Miss Heter said.

Something new in the judging process will be initiated at 7:30 o'clock tonight when judges interview the queen hopefuls prior to the 8 o'clock fashion show.

Jan Heter, mistress of ceremonies for the evening, will begin the fashion show with her introductions of the candidates.

Contestants will model first in sport clothes and then in formal attire. During the sport clothes modeling, judging will be on walk, appearance, and personality. Judging during the formal wear modeling will be on posture, poise and beauty.

After the modeling judges will confer and make their choices. Five of the 11 semi-finalists will become finalists and the remaining six will be eliminated from the contest.

The Centennial Homecoming Queen's activities will get underway immediately after the Coronation Ball, and continue through the Centennial year. Her duties next week include appearances on television and radio, and at such events as the bonfire, parade and the football game.

Hungarians Revolt Against Commies

VIENNA (UP) — Hungarians staged a revolt yesterday against their Communist government. Jet fighters strafed through the streets and gunfire echoed through Budapest as Russian troops, tanks and armored cars answered the Hungarian Regime's call for help.

Budapest radio said that fighting had stopped in "a number" of places by nightfall. But at 8 p.m. (11 a.m. PST), a broadcast said the government "has the situation in hand, but that does not mean the fighting has stopped."

Eyewitnesses reaching Austria from Budapest said "at least 350 persons have been killed so far." The witnesses added that a "great number" of jets had been roaring over the city since early morning.

"The jets repeatedly opened fire on groups of demonstrating civilians," the witness said.

"I woke up this morning, disturbed by thundering machine gun fire and artillery explosions. It is generally believed in Budapest that the uprising has spread all over the country."

The sound of machine gun and rifle shots could be heard during the repeated broadcasts of Radio

SJS Prof Wins Office Of Mayor of Saratoga

Dr. Burton R. Brazil, assistant professor of social science, was chosen to serve as mayor of the new city of Saratoga by the five-man city council at its first meeting Monday night.

Dr. Brazil, who was elected to the council Sept. 25, the same date on which the citizens of Saratoga voted by a slim margin to incorporate, was the council's unanimous choice for mayor.

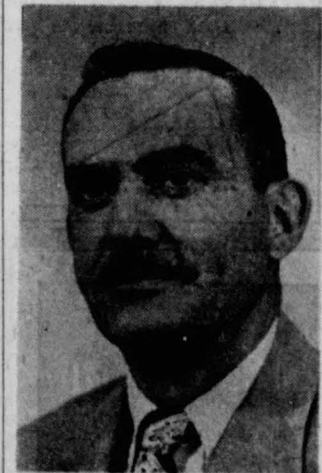
A man who has never held public office before, Dr. Brazil has been an active member of the Citizen's Committee, a group of Saratoga residents favoring incorporation.

Dr. Brazil, while serving as mayor, will retain his position on the council and be its chairman. He will serve as councilman for four years; his term as mayor is indefinite.

Dr. Brazil, with his wife and four children, has lived in Saratoga for three years. The community now has a population of almost 13,000.

Dr. Brazil said he is looking forward to the opportunity to put into practice all the things he has been studying about as a political scientist for many years.

He said he feels like a professional soldier who has spent a whole lifetime in the army but does not know anything about war because he has never been into battle. He said he is looking forward to finding out how good a soldier he really is. Dr. Brazil emphasized that he

Bruntz Receives Post Of Executive Secretary

Clayton Bruntz, senior business administration major, was appointed yesterday by the Student Council to the new post of Executive Secretary to ASB President Ray Freeman.

Bruntz will hold the office for one year. He has been a member of class councils for three years and served on Spartacamp.

His duties in general will be to lessen the time-consuming minor duties of the ASB President without infringing on the powers of the Vice President.

"Due to the increase in ASB activities," Bruntz said, "I hope to be able to relieve the President of many of his time-consuming activities and allow him more time for matters of executive decision and other matters of greater importance."

Official description of the new office states that the Executive Secretary must be a senior student on clear standing and requires a two-thirds vote of the Council approving his appointment.

Duties listed are:

1. To answer all correspondence not demanding the President's attention.
2. To offer advice to the President pertaining to meetings and projects of which he has had a part.
3. Follow up delegation and see that duties delegated are performed.
4. Assist in writing reports, records and data.

5. Attend all Student Council and executive council meetings, although not as a voting member.

6. Investigate telephone messages left in the President's absence.

7. Be a non-voting representative of the President at certain meetings for communication purposes only.

8. Aid in writing speeches.

9. In the absence of the President, he will look to the Vice President for authority.

The Executive Secretary's powers are limited to exclude voting in the Student Council, making decisions, filling in for the President in case of absence, performing the duties of the Vice President or any other ASB officer.

Council Approves SJS Alumni Loan

Student Council yesterday voted to loan the San Jose State Alumni Association \$3000 and appropriated another \$1000 to the new Committee on Concerts and Professional Artists' Performances.

The Alumni Association loan was granted after approval by the Board of Control this week. It will be in the form of a note carrying three per cent interest, payable on demand — similar to a previous loan which was made by the Association to the Student Body for improvements on the Coop.

The fund will be used to meet expenses of the expanded alumni program, including the salary of a full-time field director. Reimbursement is to be made following payment of senior dues.

In the second major financial item of yesterday's meeting, the Council unanimously approved the \$1000 fund for the new committee, to be used as a cushion in case of financial difficulties.

The committee was set up to bring top-flight professional entertainers such as Harry Belafonte and Stan Kenton, to San Jose for performances.

Applications for positions on this committee may be picked up at the Student Union this week and the Council will interview the applicants at next Wednesday's meeting. Interviews for Concert Committee posts will be held at the same time.

On a recommendation by Bob Hosfeldt, chairman of the student committee for Proposition 3, the Council declared the week of Oct. 30-Nov. 6 as "Vote Yes On 3" week.

In other action yesterday, the Council:

Appointed Curtis Luft as ASB Prosecuting Attorney, Alice Kunz as Court Clerk, Maurine Larrigan as Blood Drive chairman and Cathy Westermann and Liz Heath as members of the Blood Drive Committee.

Accepted the resignation of Masako Kawauchi as Sophomore Class representative and welcomed Bill Sturgeon as her replacement.

Recommended to the Student Union Board that the Student Union be kept open until 10 p.m. on Wednesday nights only, due to a lack of usage.

Reviewed the SJS-College of Pacific "non-aggression" pact and heard a letter from COP, inviting all Spartan students to attend a free after-game dance in Stockton, following the SJS-COP football game.

Appointed Clayton Bruntz to the new position of Executive Secretary to ASB President Ray Freeman.

United Press Roundup

Police Halt Huge March Against Russ Embassy

WARSAW — Demonstrations and street fighting broke out in Warsaw Wednesday night. Polish security police were called out to stop a march on the Russian Embassy.

Thousands of Poles gathered in front of the Hungarian Embassy here and shouted their support for the rebels in Budapest. Communist Party workers tried to scatter the crowds with clubs, and street brawls promptly broke out. Then the crowds turned and marched toward the Soviet Embassy. They were met halfway there by heavy detachments of KBW internal security troops who turned them away.

RUSSIANS TO STAY

WARSAW — Poland's new Communist Party leader Wladyslaw Gomułka said yesterday Soviet troops will remain on Polish soil "as long as militarists are to the fore in Western Germany."

But both he and Premier Josef Cyrankiewicz insisted the Russian soldiers would be under the control of the Warsaw pact authorities and would not be used for internal security.

IRE CONTERS ON RIOTS

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower conferred with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles for one hour yesterday on the Hungarian and Polish crisis.

Dulles told newsmen later that he and the President are "particularly interested" in the developments in Poland and Hungary.

The State Department disclosed that it has been unable to contact the U.S. legation in Budapest since late Tuesday.

'SMUGGLING' CHARGED

Adlai E. Stevenson accused the Eisenhower administration yesterday of a "smuggling intimacy" with the giants of business and a

narrow lack of concern for everything that does not "pay off in the cash ledger."

In a speech prepared for delivery before a businessmen's lunch in New York City, the Democratic presidential candidate said his party is "the best friend American business has."

IKE ADDRESSES WOMEN

WASHINGTON — President Eisenhower assured the women of Eisenhower Wednesday that they can look for continued prosperity in the cities and on the farms under Republicans, in a nation-wide television program.

But he said frankly that he would only be making a "crystal ball" guess if he tried to predict how soon it may be possible to end the draft. And he said it is still necessary to keep the H-bomb as a "deterrent for war that aggressors otherwise might start."

SANTA CRUZ FIRE

SANTA CRUZ — A \$209,000 fire early yesterday destroyed Brookdale Lodge, well-known for a trout-filled stream that flowed through its dining room.

Approximately 100 firemen from throughout northern Santa Cruz County arrived too late to prevent flames from sweeping through the luxurious lodge and an attached 12-room house 12 miles north of here.

Seven persons in the house, including the lodge owner Barney Morrow, escaped without injury.

ESTES BLASTS WILSON

DETROIT — Sen. Estes Kefauver kicked off his one-day drive to capture Michigan's 20 electoral votes today with a blast at Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson and a renewed plea for the world to stop test-firing of nuclear bombs.

X Stands for Intelligent Voting

The letter X often has been a sign of the inability to write. It has come to be associated with illiteracy.

Today and tomorrow it must become a sign of intelligence. Candidates for class offices meet the test of the student voter. Intelligent voting is the only type of voting recommended by the SPARTAN DAILY.

We've done our part by printing the candidates' platforms but exercising the right to vote rests with the students and no amount of editorial urging is needed to impress this right.

Class officers are important. They are a source of learning and experiment for those interested in student government. They are a starting point for students who later plan to run for higher student body offices.

San Jose State has been fortunate in having well-qualified candidates running for student body offices. This has come as result of intelligent choices made by the student voters in class elections.

Don't make the X mark a mark of illiteracy. Present and future student government demands qualified student leaders.

Let's give those students deemed qualified a vote of confidence. If you can't wield the X mark with proficiency, then we advise no use of it at all.

Successful Alum Group Adds Prestige to Sparta

Any college or university builds its reputation not only on the prowess of the athletic teams, but, more important, on the ability of its alumni to succeed. The success of the alumni contributes not only to the prestige of the college, but to every individual student.

This is probably the most important function of any alumni association. If the association is strong both in activities and in number, it not only builds a good reputation for the college, but also increases the value of the degree obtained by the student.

Now approaching the category of a major national alumni association, the SJS organization has striven in the past to accomplish this task. One of the outstanding contributors to the Association is Ed Mosher, former ASB president, and third vice president of the alumni association.

ACTIVE AS UNDERGRAD

Mosher, class of '52, was quite

any other major U.S. college, and has been instrumental in inaugurating alumni functions which will become tradition.

During his sophomore year at SJS, he was the main figure in the inauguration of the traditional homecoming festivities. He not only served as ASB president during 1952, but also was quite active in rally and homecoming committees.

At present Mosher is at work searching for a Field Secretary to serve with the alumni association. This job will be a full time one and will firmly class the SJS association with other major colleges and universities. The secretary's job will be a threefold one. He will help to develop chapters throughout the U.S. and will try to set up some sort of placement service in connection with these chapters.

TO ACT AS LIAISON

Secondly, he will act as a liaison between the alumni and the students at the college. He will protect traditions, aid the students in achieving new traditions and will act as adviser to the senior class.

Thirdly, he will handle all alumni public relations in the County of Santa Clara.

Mosher stated that the applicant must have graduated from SJS and must be familiar with the college.

INCREASE IN MEMBERSHIP

Another big advance for the association is the increase in paid membership. Mosher hopes that by January the association will have an enrollment of 5,000 paid members. At present it stands at 4,700. When the membership is increased to 5,000 this will enable the association to employ national advertising in its magazine, which will help to increase the number of pages.

One of the features which Mosher pointed out about the alumni association was the obtaining of tickets for its members. A block of fifty yard line seats are reserved during football games for members of the alumni association. Tickets may be obtained by calling at the office or writing in, care of San Jose State College. The association will also take care of hotel reservations for alumni from out of town who come to see the game.

Another advantage is the emergency accident insurance. This policy, which guarantees the covering of bills up to \$25, states that the organization will contact any member's family when notified in case of accident.

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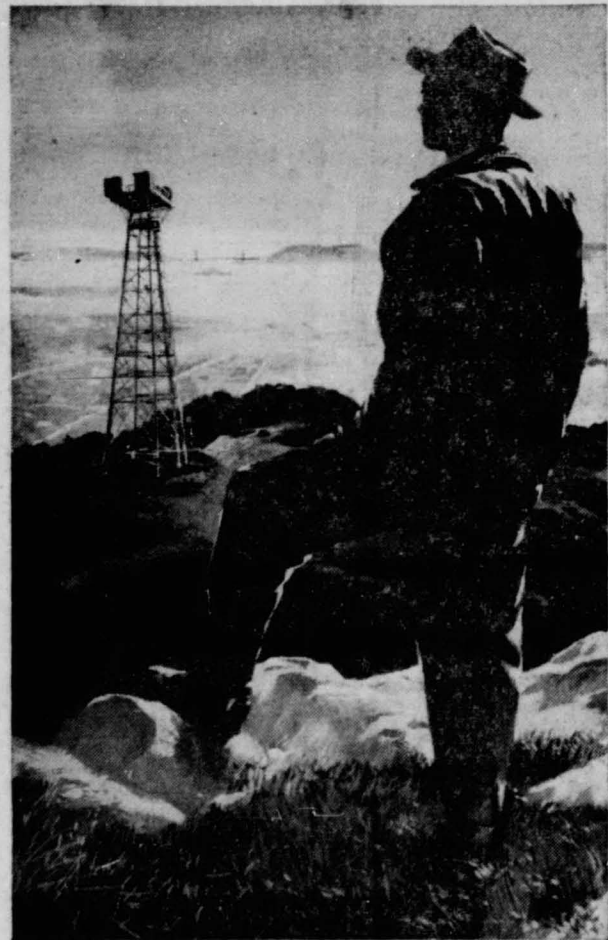
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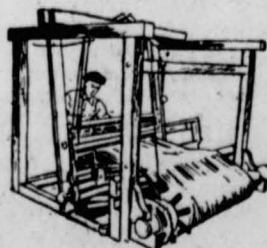
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Elv To Rock, Roll In Cadence Count

Presley was not available for comment. But an informed source told United Press the rock 'n' roll singer had obtained necessary papers while in Hollywood filming the movie "Love Me Tender."

Presley's draft board here denied that "anybody would know" before the board, unless the singer decided to enlist.

ARTISTS' MATERIALS

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Claude Gilbert Breaks Leg Raiders Seventh In Total Offense

Injury struck the San Jose State football squad again yesterday as fullback Claude Gilbert of Bakersfield broke his leg.

The hard-luck guy of the Spartan squad previously suffered a broken ankle in the Spring Bowl game and was just beginning to round into form.

Gilbert played a few minutes in the San Diego State-State game and that may prove to be the extent of his grid action for the 1956 season. The break is in the tibia bone. It is not the same leg that was broken last spring.

The injury occurred while Gilbert was playing defense. A

pileup occurred as Gilbert tackled Fullback George Cobbs.

Walt Ackemann has been switched from halfback to fullback in order to replace Gilbert.

Coach Bob Bronzan said that the traveling squad for the Arizona State game will not be difficult to choose. "We will take everyone that is able-bodied," he commented.

Latest figures on the San Jose State team show that the Spartans are seventh in the nation in total offense with a 371 yard per game average. Quarterback Bob Reinhart is eighth in the individual race with 608 yards. He is third in the nation in passing with 48 completions in 88 tries for 638 yards.

Halfback Art Powell holds tenth position in pass receiving with 14 receptions for 306 yards.

Top ground gainer for the Golden Raiders is little Jim Riley of Bakersfield. Riley has gained 174 yards in 15 carries for a fine 11.6 average. He is tied with Art Powell for the scoring lead with three touchdowns. Reinhart has scored 17 points.

Hoop Mentor Gives Estimate Of SJS Squad

With the first cut out of the way and the squad down to a manageable 27, Coach Walt McPherson made a quick estimate of the Spartan basketball team yesterday.

"We have speed, hustle and some good shots, but we are lacking in height and experience at the forward spots," he said.

McPherson was looking forward to having Hal Boutte and Art Powell join the team. They are expected as soon as the football season is over. Both are forwards and should give the Spartans some needed rebounding strength.

Also figuring in McPherson's plans for the forward slots are Denny Harris and Gil Eglund. Harris, a service returnee, played on the Frosh club in '52, and McPherson termed him "greatly improved." Eglund, a letter-winner last year, has been working well.

Lee Meggison reported back at practice yesterday after having been out since the opening day with a severe cut on his right hand, incurred in an auto accident. Meggison is another service returnee who played on the '52 Frosh.

The California Bears dealt the Spartan water polo team its second straight loss, 14-4, in the Berkeley pool yesterday.

The San Jose team managed to hold the Bears to a 2-1 half-time lead, but they fell apart in the second half when the superior swimming and passing of the California crew finally took its toll.

Dale Anderson netted three goals for the Spartans while Art Lambert picked up the other SJS tally.

In the preliminary game, the Cal Frosh walloped the Spartan Frosh, 10-1. Scoring ace, Ozzie Osborn missed the game due to a cold.

Sounding Off

Bob Bronzan's chances of being named as a coach for the West team in the annual Shrine East-West all-star football classic sank to the bottom of the shaft yesterday afternoon when the announcement came over the wire that Lawrence T. "Buck" Shaw had been appointed head coach of the West team, replacing Red Sanders, who was forced to bow out of the picture Monday.

Shaw, head coach at the Air Force Academy, not only got the job ahead of Bronzan, who only had been mentioned in connection with the vacant job, but also vaulted over University of Utah coach Jack Curtice who was supposed to take over in case of a vacancy.

San Jose State is getting used to being ignored by the Shrine game officials but we doubt if the Salt Lake City folks will be happy about the announcement. Whether or not Curtice is the football coach that Shaw is, is not the question. Shrine officials simply ignored the man they had picked.

Shaw left the Bay Area under a slight cloud. He was fired as head coach by the San Francisco 49ers but since his departure, the club has yet to win more than they have lost. Shaw formerly taught football at the University of Santa Clara and is well known in the Prune Valley.

As for Bronzan, he still has a chance to gain a Shrine coaching berth. Obviously Curtice still stands as the alternate coach for the classic. However, depending upon this week's results, the West team may need two new coaches and Bronzan pops right back into the picture.

Abe Martin, one of the two remaining coaches, pits his Texas Christian University team against Baylor with the winner on its way to a Hangover Day date in the Cotton Bowl. Should TCU win, Martin will be too busy to bother with the San Francisco game.

The other assistant coach, Dallas Ward of the University of Colorado, has his team in the bidding of an Orange Bowl engagement if he can bring it home second in the Big Seven. Oklahoma is a shoe-in for the conference crown but cannot repeat its appearance in Miami and thus the battle for second place in the league becomes the high point of activity in that sector.

If, by some manner of means, both Ward and Martin should find themselves with bowl bids, Bronzan's name again might appear on the horizon.

In past years, the player selection committee for the West team has snubbed its nose at San Jose State. Only four Spartans, LeRoy Zimmerman, Tom Louderback, Bud Hubbard and Bob Pifferini have played in "Football's Finest Hour". Louderback's effort was limited to the final 30 seconds of the first half while the West was bowing gracefully like young gentlemen.

Several sportscasters in the Bay Area have had their innings during the past several days cutting the idea of a nation-wide football conference to include UCLA, USC, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, the Air Force Academy, Army, Navy and Pittsburgh.

The negative attitude taken by these men is in no way a measure of the good such a conference would do. Notre Dame, Army, Pittsburgh and the Air Force Academy have shown interest in the plan. Navy has been cool to the idea but may warm up if something concrete is done.

Major stumbling block in the path of the new conference would be the including of UCLA, USC and Oklahoma. All three are members of conferences, the latter in the Big Seven and the other two of the Pacific Coast Conference.

Since the so-called scandals that hit the West Coast concerning the over-payment of athletes, the two Southern California universities have been thinking of giving the PCC back to the Indians. Both the Bruins and the Trojans are tired of being whipping boys for the untouched of the rest of the league.

USC, when its period of standing in the corner is over, could step out of the PCC without any trouble. UCLA will have a more difficult time. As part of the University of California, it would take a vote of the regents to let the Los Angeles campus bolt the PCC.

As for Oklahoma, it would be a fine thing for the Big Seven and the Sooners. As it is now, the Big Seven is divided into two divisions, Oklahoma and the rest of the league. Bud Wilkinson must realize that his legions are too strong for the "Little Six" and that Oklahoma should leave the conference in favor of the new group or play an independent schedule.

University of Miami officials probably are viewing the proposed formation of the new league with hope. The Hurricanes have blossomed into a power and could hold their own in anybody's loop.
