Both Tedd Wallace, chairman of the Community Service Committee, and Joe Wondrack, chairman of personal solicitation for the drive, blamed the fact that Sparta Key was not available to the volunteer solicitors.

Department Offers One Unit for Trip

Sign-ups will begin Wednesday, Jan. 8 for next semester's Easter vacation trip to the Lower California coast, which offers participants 1 unit of biological science credit.

Dr. Rocci Pisano, associate professor of biology, in charge of the trip, announced that the project has been approved by the President's Council, and officially is called "Seashore Life," Biology 178. Enrollment is limited, he stressed, adding that students may register in his office, S203.

Applications will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis, and will include a brief interview with Dr. Pisano. Last year "dozens and dozens" of students had to be turned down, Dr. Pisano said. Final decisions will be made on a selective basis.

The group will travel by auto, and camp and cook on the beach. "Last year we were 9 feet from the water's edge," Dr. Pisano recalled. Average cost is from \$40 to \$45, and includes transportation, food and registration.

Ice, Snow Covers Sierra Highways

There is snow on the ground and ice on the roads in the Sierra Mountain areas, according to recent weather reports. Chains are required on all highways.

Highway 40 from Baxter to Donner Gate is now open but roads are dangerous and icy. Highway 50 is temporarily closed from Strawberry to Myers Grade. Highway 89 on the West shore of Lake Tahoe is still closed, and on the North side it was snowing yesterday. Carson, Ebbetts and Sonora passes are reported slippery due to snow on the pavement.

Snowfall at Soda Springs is reported to be 36 inches; Squaw Valley, 32 inches; Morgan Summit, 22 inches; Pedler Hill, 23 inches; Strawberry, 18 inches.

Skiing conditions are expected to be good over Christmas vacation.



Lions Drill Secretly For Biggie

SAN FRANCISCO—(UP)—Coach George Wilson of the Detroit Lions was cooking up something special for the San Francisco Forty Niners again yesterday as he put his club through their paces at Stanford University in secret practice for the second day in a row.

Wilson, grim and with a determined look on his face, barred all reporters from the practice field—including the newsmen from Detroit who travel with the team. He even barred the Lions own publicity man, Bud Erickson, from the field.

Just what Wilson and Co. had in mind for the Forty Niners was a puzzle that won't be known until the kick-off Sunday in Kezar Stadium, where 60,000 fans will be packed into the bowl to watch the play-off for the Western Division Championship and the right to meet the Cleveland Browns for the national title a week later.

"We have an injury riddled squad," said Wilson, "but we aren't offering any alibis."

He then raced through the names of men who have been slowed by injuries—or who were out completely.

Wilson said that the team is "optimistic" about the outcome of the game and it isn't frightened at all by the odds that make the Forty Niners three-point favorites.

"We are optimistic, but not over-confident," said Wilson. "We believe that we can win with the proper breaks. If the breaks go the other way, then things will be rough." Wilson and the rest of the Lions have a lot of confidence in Tobin Rote, who will fill in at the quarterback slot for Layne.

San Jose State boxing fans who watched the recent Novice mitt-fest can expect even more spirit-

ed action in the ninth annual All-College Boxing Tournament Tuesday, Jan. 7 in Spartan Gym.

Nine bouts have been scheduled to date and there is a strong possibility three more bouts will be added to the program, according to Spartan boxing Coach Julie Menendez.

Winners in seven of the matches will gain first team spots on the Spartan varsity. Other bouts on the program will be exhibitions.

Menendez pointed out that Nick Akana, 125-pounder; Dave Nelson, 132-pounder; and Stu Rubine, 147-pounder, have already been tabbed first team members in their respective weight divisions.

Menendez is currently attempting to schedule exhibition bouts for the trio with Armed Services boxers.

Akana, classy Hawaiian slugger, is expected to be very successful in competition this season. Hard-hitting Akana will drop down into the 125-lb. division this season after competing in the 132-lb. bracket last year.

Dick Rall of Washington State and Akana provided collegiate boxing fans with top flight action last season.

The pair met on three occasions, each winning once and the other bout being called a draw.

Akana edged Rall in the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate finals, while Rall reversed the decision in the finals of the NCAA tournament. The draw occurred in dual meet action between SJS and Washington State.

Rubine, who was an NCAA finalist at 156-lbs. last season, drops down to the 147-lb. category. Rubine is a two year letterman. Nelson, a service veteran, is a swift combination boxer.

One of the top and interesting battles in the All-College meet is expected in the 139-lb. division where brothers Welvin and Will Stroud clash. Welvin, a two year letterman, was a PCI and NCAA finalist last season.

Will, novice champion last season, is not as experienced as his brother, but is aggressive and a potent puncher. Both boxers make good use of the "windmill" style.

Bob Tafoya and T. C. Chung, both returning lettermen to Menendez' squad, will vie in the 119-lb. bout.

In a 132-lb. exhibition match, varsity returnee Frank Castillo clashes with Jerry Ford, who was named the outstanding boxer in

the novice tournament.

Hank Gallegus and Delphis Chagnon, two other novice champs, will mix it up in an exhibition, 125-lb. bout.

Jack Coolidge, a two year senior letterman, tackles Dalton Roland in the 156-lb. match, while at 165-lbs. Stan Dowell faces Ken Christensen.

Varsity returnee Russ Camilleri meets Harold Mince in the 178-lb. scrap. Carl Christensen and Prentis Porter square-off in the 190-lb. fray.

An interesting battle should develop in the heavyweight division when Archie Milton and Al Severino throw blows. Milton is a newcomer to the varsity ranks, while Severino gained a great deal of experience last season.
