

# Thugs Evade Bloodhounds; Intense Search Continues

An intensive search still is underway for the eight men who escaped from San Kwinter early Monday morning. These men, all dangerous, are members of the Overtive Elements league who were imprisoned after terrorizing San Jose State college's Spardi Gras last May.

The men overpowered the guards and escaped in the Warden's "Queen Hornet." An all-state search was broadcast shortly after the prison break.

Authorities believe that the thugs are in the vicinity of San

Jose. Fellow prisoners said that the men made frequent boasts that if they ever got out they would show State college students a "thing or two."

An authentic report states that eight men answering the description of the leaguers were seen wading across the lower end of Alviso slough early this morning. San Kwinter guards and several blood hounds were dispatched to Alviso.

Anyone having information leading to the whereabouts of these men is directed to notify the nearest police station or FBI office immediately.

Fingers, Mugsy, Trigger, Nails, Knuckles, Sharky, Stranger, and Lipky can be identified by the traditional garb of the organization which consists of a long black cloak, large brimmed black hat, and a thick black beard.

Joe Rowan, police fraternity president, said that he and his men are fully prepared to protect those attending Spardi Gras festivities from these men. It is deemed unlikely, however, that they will dare to show themselves in daylight.






### Mayors, City Officials To Judge Contests

### We Can Beat This; Gripe Sessions Plus Spardi Gras

NEW YORK, May 21 (UP)—Seven psychiatrists from the veterans administration reported today that certain types of mental patients recover more quickly if they are allowed to hold "gripe sessions" as a group.

In such sessions, the doctors pointed out, the patients have an emotional outlet. They are permitted to discuss their problems together and have the opportunity to air their objections and resentments over experiences in the mental institution.

These VA doctors, reporting to the annual meeting of the American Psychiatric association, also said that patients nearing the time they are to be discharged are permitted to have "dramatic classes" in which they act out the situations they may confront when again with society.

The two schemes are part of group psychotherapy which the doctors said is speeding up recovery.

Under the group plan, patients are divided into sections, with the

psychoneurotic disorders on one; the actual psychotic cases in another; and another category, including chronic alcoholics, in the third group.

Those who appear about ready to leave the hospital are in the mixed group. Different techniques, the doctors reported, are adopted by the therapists with each of the groups, depending on the degree of participation that may be expected of the patients.



## JUNIOR VARSITY ENTER SIX MEN IN ARMY RELAYS

San Jose State's junior varsity track will enter six men in the 6th Army's annual track and field meet to be held in San Francisco's Kezar stadium tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock, according to Coaches Vern Cooley and Woody Linn.

The Spartans include: Bill Passey, in the high hurdles; Roger Smythe in the low hurdles; Frank Knight in the 880; Dick Kaufman, sprints; and Stu Inman in the 440. Passey has been a consistent winner in the high hurdles, while Smythe captured three first places against Santa Clara High, and two against Bellarmine.

Other colleges which have entered the 6th Army's relays include: San Francisco, Santa Rosa, San Mateo Junior colleges, and several army teams.

## TRACKMEN INVADE COLISEUM TONIGHT; MODESTO TOMORROW

Six men will carry the colors of San Jose State college to the Los Angeles coliseum tonight for the seventh annual relay show. Last year the Spartans picked up only six points while the team title went to the University of Southern California.

Thelno Knowles will enter the mile run against some of the top milers in the nation, including USC's Roland Sink. Last year Knowles ran third behind Johnny Fulton and Ralph Gold in the 880 yard run. Gold will be back this year in the mile for UCLA.

Don Smalley, San Jose's diminutive sprinter, will go against Mel Patton and Donnie Anderson in the 100 yard dash tonight. Last year Smalley could do no better than fourth in the coliseum, but is hoping for a better showing this year. He will have several other competitors from Baylor and Texas to contend with this year.

Woody Linn, who has the best discus mark on the coast this year at 156 feet, will face a tough field in this event. Among the entrants is Bob Fitch, who threw 180 feet last year for a new unofficial record, and Fortune Gordon, last year's NCAA champ.

In the 440 yard sprint relay, the Spartans again will be the underdogs against USC and the LAAC sprinters. Last year San Jose was second behind the Trojans and are given little chance of changing that this year. However, Smalley, Billy Rhyne, Bob Bingham, and Steve O'Meara will be trying to reverse the outcome of the relay last week at Fresno when they ran third.

Saturday afternoon and evening, San Jose State college's track team will participate in the California relays at Modesto. Again San Jose will be up against USC, UCLA, California, Stanford, Fresno State, College of Pacific, Olympic club, and the Los Angeles Athletic club.

The Spartans will enter the two sprint relays and the medley relay and possibly the mile and two-mile relay. In the open events, Smalley will enter the 100 yard dash and Jack Passey will start in the high hurdles.

## BIRDIE BATTERS WILL MEET SAN MATEO


Members of the Badminton club will sponsor a tournament with San Mateo Junior college, Wednesday evening, June 4, in the Women's gym.
