





Rapazzini Cops Tournament Lightweight Championship

SJS Clinches 2nd; Williams Sets Record

Carroll Williams sank 14 straight free throws in the second half last night as San Jose State's Spartans turned back the St. Mary's Gaels, 68-58, in Moraga, assuring themselves of at least a tie for second place in the California Basketball Association.

The Spartans connected on 26 out of 27 free throws during the second half and made good on 32 out of 36 for the night to post a remarkable 88.8 percentage.

Williams equalled one CBA record and set another with his free throws. Fourteen straight matched a mark held jointly by Williams and Kenny Sears of Santa Clara and established a record for the most consecutive free throws in one half.

Coupled with three field goals, Williams' charity tosses gained him high scoring honors for the Spartans with 20. Bill Sanchez sparked the Gaels with 25 points before fouling out with 1:30 to play in the game.

Sixteen points by Williams in the second half pulled the game out of the fire for the Spartans after St. Mary's took the lead shortly after the intermission.

The teams battled on even terms with the lead changing hands twice and the score tied four times before San Jose took a commanding 12-point lead with six minutes to play.

In the first half sophomore guard Tom Crane and junior forward John Erceg rose to the occasion to give the Spartans a 32-31 half-time edge. Crane tallied 12 and Erceg 10 in the first 20 minutes.

Although San Jose led from the opening tip-off and opened a 30-22 margin with three minutes to play in the half, St. Mary's went in front 21.20 with nine straight Top Grapplers points. Erceg tanked two free throws to put San Jose back in front at half-time.

The win gives the Spartans a six win, five loss record in CBA play with one game to play.




