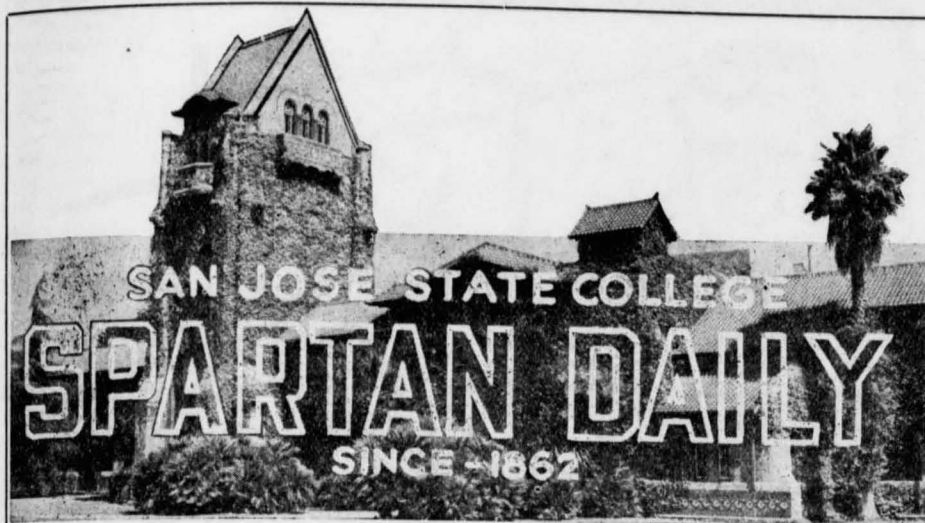

A large tryout is expected by Mr. William McCoard, director of the society, as Playreaders is now fully organized and is planning an important part in college activities this year.

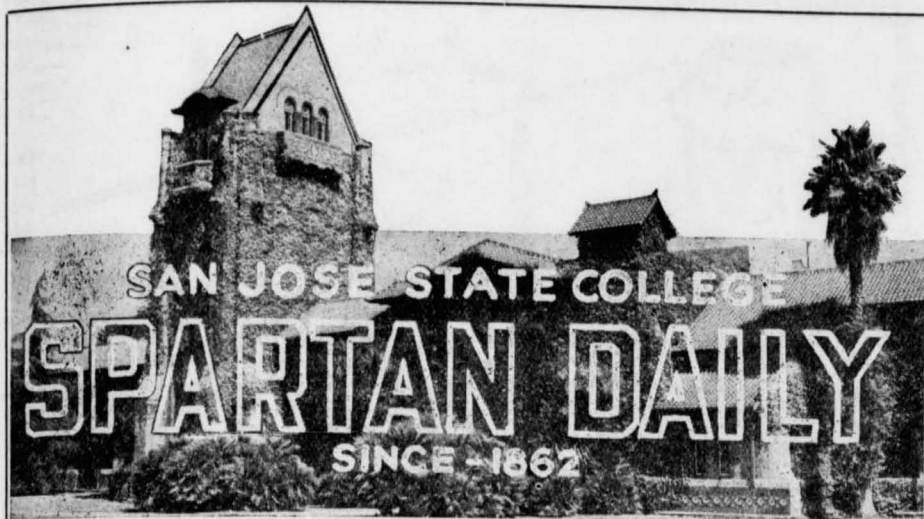
## Holiday Tennis Sign-up Requested By DeGroot

The backfield should read Rios at full, Hilton and Boggs at the halfbacks and Birlem at quarter. If Boggs is bothered by his knee, Portal has Bailey, Pavioni and Nielson all set to shove into the breach.
