Czechoslovakia, the country which played such an important part in world news several days ago, again occupies the limelight—but this time as the subject of an exhibit on the bulletin board outside the library.

A picture of Thomas Garrigue Masaryk, president of the Czechoslovak Republic from 1918 to 1935, showing the Czech figure in a pensive mood, holds the center of attention.

Czech farming customs are illustrated by a photograph of a farmer sowing seeds by hand—a relapse to Biblical agricultural methods.

Children of Czechoslovakia is the title of another picture in the exhibit. The four young Czechs present smiling and untroubled countenances to the world.

Vividly costumed in the traditional Czech dress of bright-hued, billowing skirt, blouse, and apron, a coy maiden displays for approval the clothing of her native country.

In the preliminary contest the State frosh will make an effort to maintain their unblemished record when they battle the No. 3 team of the Olympic Club.

The Seals will be nearly at full strength for the first time this season, as Al Wempe has returned to the waves and undertows of the local duck pond. Although not in the opening lineup, Wempe will be on the bench, and ready for use if he is needed.

The only doubt in the opening lineup is whether Bob Locks or Wesley P. Hammond will open at one of the guard spots. Leon Sparrow, one of the Fullerton Jaycee transfers, seems to have clinched himself one of the other back spots along with Claude Horan, fellow chain ganger of Sparrow's from Fullerton.

As for the freshmen, Coach Charlie Walker was quite pleased with their showing against the O. C. No. 4 team on Tuesday night, and plans to use the same lineup with possibly one exception.

Outstanding for the yearling Seals has been Johnny Hood, the addition to the diving squad, who has even made some of the varsity players look foolish in some of the afternoon scrimmages. John Hatch, another swimming recruit devoting his spare time to a little waterpolo, has given quite a good account of himself in the goal for the frosh, and bids fair to become one of the league's outstanding players.

Tonight's freshman game will start at eight o'clock sharp, with the varsity fiasco following immediately afterward. Probably between 8:45 and 9:00.

For the first time this year the Spartan soccer team will be the underdog when they travel to Berkeley to play the Bears this Saturday.

In the first three league games the local eleven was definitely placed in the role of favorite due to a good early season showing.

DEFENDING CHAMPS

This week, however, the Spartans will be up against the defending champions. California, in fact, has been the leader of the conference for the last two years. In Captain Les Musante they have an All-Conference center forward who is considered one of the best in the bay area, where, incidentally, soccer is one of the most popular sports among clubs, even rivaling basketball in that respect.

Musante may be handicapped this Saturday due to a wrenched back received in last week's 5-2 win over San Mateo junior college. The injury is not serious, however, and will not keep the veteran captain out of the lineup. Another crippled Bear is Dick Mutti, who has been suffering from infected toes for the past two weeks and may still be on the shelf when the San Jose team visits the Campanile stronghold.

Are Eskimos an Oriental people?

To solve this ancient riddle was one of the goals of Father Bernard Hubbard's year and a half expedition to King Island, Alaska, according to Ed Levin, former student here who has accompanied the Glacier Priest on his last three northern expeditions.

Speaking before Industrial Arts majors and minors at their annual get together Tuesday, Levin recounted the experiences and hardships of the expedition in a land where nights are six months long and temperatures drop to 50 below zero.

King Islanders show strong facial resemblance to Chinese and Japanese and their language is similar to that of the Chinese which leads many scientists to believe that they are a people who migrated from the Siberian Mainland, said Levin.

"Tuberculosis is had by 80 to 90 per cent of the Islanders."

Reasons for this, according to Levin, is the cramped living quarters of natives made necessary by the frigid climate of the country.

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Police School Class Hears Speech By Bebenin, Shanghai Lieutenant

Vladimir S. Bebenin, Lieutenant of Inspectors for the International Police department in Shanghai, China, spoke yesterday before the police school class in Introduction to Police Organization and Administration.

"When I entered service I was told I was to be a public servant; I resented this as police officers are insulted more than anyone else," stated Inspector Bebenin, who gave interesting highlights on police work in the International Settlement, where for 14 years he was a member of the International Police department.

He was born and educated in Russia, and learned to speak English while in China. Besides the English language, he also speaks Japanese, Indian, Russian, and Chinese fluently.

OPIUM WAR

Mr. Bebenin told of the origin of the International Settlement and police, which was started by the Opium War between China and England, developing the International Division, the French, and the Chinese centers. According to the inspector, there are approximately four thousand men who are members of the International police.

The most interesting statement that Inspector Bebenin gave was the fact that in Shanghai there

are no juries, and no man may be arrested after nine o'clock in the evening, unless he is being some mode of transportation to take him from the city; however, the jail in the International Settlement holds 6000, and is full all the time.

CHIEF DIFFICULTY

According to Inspector Bebenin, the chief difficulty in China for policemen is that the Chinese will never interfere with anything outside of his family life, thus he will not divulge any information.

"Indians make good policemen. Chinese are loyal and spunky. Japanese are good but are very slow thinkers," he said. "Most Chinese detectives like everyone to know they are such and although they are not required to wear a uniform, they rig up a queer outfit by which everyone may recognise them."
