#### REGISTRATION DROPS FROM FALL RECORD

Enrollment for the winter quarter totaled 3,133 today, according to Mr. Joe West, registrar.

Although surpassing last winter's registration by 204 the total fell 315 short of fall registration when 3448 students were enrolled.

During the last quarter 90 students withdrew from school and there were 21 refunds. One hundred and forty-seven students attending in the fall quarter were disqualified for the term.

#### James Clancy Directs Initial Play Of Winter Quarter; Large Cast

Tryouts for the fantastic Kaufman-Connelly satire, "Beggar on Horseback", will be held today at 4 o'clock in the college Little Theater under James Clancy's direction.

##### FIRST PRODUCTION

The first production of the three-play winter quarter season, "Beggar on Horseback" will be given a two-day run January 26 and 27.

Boasting one of the largest casts of the year with roles for approximately 30 men and women, the play will be difficult to stage but extremely humorous—and the Kaufman-Connelly combination has become well known for their masterful handling of extreme humor.

Main roles are made up in the triangle—the rich girl, the poorer girl, and the poor, struggling artist who is being forced to marry money while preferring the "gal across the hall". ### Berkeley Officer Added To Police School Faculty

#### Willard Schmidt Takes Over Field Work

Added to the list of faculty members of San Jose State's Police School is Willard E. Schmidt, retiring member of the Berkeley Police department, and who for the past 14 years has been in active service in all police fields.

Mr. Schmidt is taking over the course in Advanced Field Work, formerly taught by William A. Wiltberger, Police School head, and is also instructing the newly developed class in "Searches at the Crime Scene", given two days a week.

At present he is part time instructor and student as he is earning his college degree, but according to Wiltberger, Schmidt has been employed because of his broad knowledge of police work. He studied for two years previous before he was old enough to be on the Berkeley Police department.

He is married, resides in Los Gatos, and is retiring the end of this month.

As a matter of fact the possibility is greater than ever this year. The Physical Education department is growing every season and it is quite likely that by next fall the business of coaching Spartan football and directing the athletic department will be more than one man will be able to handle.

"If and when changes are made in this regard the possibility exists, as it does every year, that the coaching staff will undergo certain changes."

### TWENTY FLYING CLUB OFFERED AS UNIT IN FEDERAL PROGRAM

Offering the Twenty Flying club, San Jose State college student aviators organization, as a test unit in the contemplated expansion of private flying in the United States, Mr. Frank F. Peterson, club adviser, has filed application with the civil aeronautics such centers throughout the country.

Plans for training 20,000 college students annually were recently approved by President Roosevelt. Although these plans only call for

training in civilian flight, it is hoped by the aeronautics authorities that many of those so trained would enter the army or navy reserve and be trained in combat tactics.

Just how the training program will be organized is at present undetermined, according to Mr. Peterson, but if the government accepts the offer of the Twenty Flying club, San Jose State college students should have available a course in flying at a negligible cost.

### JAPANESE WRESTLERS INVADE SPARTAN GYM FOR OPENING TUSSLES

No one can accuse Wrestling Coach Eugene Gratton of starting off with the easy ones. The Spartan mat mentor announced this week that his varsity team would open the 1939 mat season against an all-star wrestling squad from Japan.

#### SEVEN STARS

Seven wrestlers from the Orient, currently on a barnstorming tour in America, will stop over in San Jose January 7 to give the local bone benders an evening's entertainment.

Heading the foreign delegation will be Eichie Kazama, All-Japan champion in the 158 pound division. Kazama sprang a major upset last summer by defeating Emilia Bruno, Spartan mat favorite and national 145 pound king. Bruno and Kazama are being billed as the main eventers in the coming matches. They have wrestled twice, Bruno winning the initial match.

Other Spartan wrestlers who will appear against the Japanese include Melvin Rush, 165; Jack Fiebig, 135; Con Lacey, 123; Fred Albright, 128; and Fortune Masdeo, 145.

### Spartan Boxers Will Hold Huge Mitt Tournament

### Spartan Basketball Handed Drubbings By Tourney Casaba Foes

Running wild in both of their games last night, the San Francisco Alligators established themselves as the "standout team" of the current State college basketball tournament which winds up tonight in Spartan Pavilion.

The San Franciscans spanked our Spartans, 30-16, and snowed under Fresno by a 33-18 margin to roll their total over two nights of play up to 104 points. While the 'Gators were threading the hoop with regularity to crack the century mark in the scoring column, they also managed to show up well in the defensive department of the game with only 74 points scored against them in the four half-time contests they have played.

San Jose's Spartans, who came through with a win and a tie in Wednesday night's play, dropped a close one last night to Chico by a 20-16 score before being massacred by the foggy city quintet.

Bill Hubbard's crew played promising ball against Chico, but faded badly against San Francisco. "Swede" Smersfelt caged four field goals to pace the locals with 8 points in the Chico game, but got little support from his running mate, Gus Kotta, pacemaker in the scoring department Wednesday night. Kotta was noticeably handicapped with a bruised heel, and was unable to employ his "breakaway" tactics to get in for cripple shots.

It was simply poor basketball that spelled ruin for the locals in the San Francisco encounter. The Spartans went to pieces both on offense and defense to take a (Continued on Page Four)
