Community Chest Drive Opens Next Week; Goal Is Set At 300 Dollars

Boxing Matches, Jamboree Planned To Close Drive; College Organizations Asked For Contributions From Each Member

San Jose State college's annual Community Chest drive officially opens Monday, Bob Work, Chest head, announced yesterday. The quota for this year has again been set at \$300.

All college organizations will be asked to contribute five cents per member, Chest heads said, with contributions accepted at the Controller's office this week and on through the campaign.

Emphasizing the need for organization contributions to be turned in this week, Work said the giant Chest-O-Graph, marking the percentage of the quota of each group turned in, would go up Monday in front of the Morris Dailey auditorium and a good showing from each organization on the graph would do much to speed up the campaign.

Planning the Community Chest program along last year's successful lines when the college finished the drive seven dollars short of the \$300 quota, Chest heads will present a variety show, the "Community Chest Jamboree", on November 2 or 3, and boxing matches on November 10 will close the drive.

The Jamboree will feature the talent of college students and one or more of the prominent local dance bands, with the "Sweatsock Five", made up of Len Baskin, Bob Tremaine, Jack Windsor, Wes Hammond, and "Fungi" Peters as featured entertainers. A small student admission fee will be charged.

Center Section Reserved For Spartan Rooters

San Jose State college rooters will go "big time" at the College of Pacific game Friday night, according to Head Yell Leader Bob Swanson.

A center section of 50-yard line seats will be reserved for bona-fide rooters and the Spartan band, Swanson said.

Only men students, preferably with rooters caps, will be allowed to sit in a 500-seat section directly above the 100-seat area reserved for the band. Co-eds with pom-poms will occupy the 200-seat section directly over the men, he announced.

Swanson emphasized that couples will not be allowed to sit together in the reserved center section but must split up if they wish to be in the main rooting section. Couples who wish to sit together will have to sit in section E on the 15-yard line, he stated.

As in the past games, Spartan Knights and members of the Rally committee will be on hand to see that high school students and adults are kept out of the center section, and also that men and women students are split into their designated sections.

Special Late Bus Chartered For C.O.P. Game

A special bus will be chartered for students who will be unable to leave on the Spartan Special tomorrow at 2:15. Tickets for the bus which will leave at 4:15, will be sold in the Controller's office until 4:00 today. Tickets will cost \$1.65 if 35 students ride on the bus, and \$2.30 if 20 students go. No bus will be chartered for less than 20 students. Students who go on the bus must return in the same bus.

Staters Dance To Stockton For COP Game Tomorrow

SPECIAL TRAIN LEAVES DEPOT AT 2:15; ARRIVES 4:30

Victory-seeking Spartan rooters will dance their way to Stockton tomorrow afternoon when the Spartan Special leaves the Southern Pacific depot for the Stockton fair of the College of Pacific Tigers.

The dancing car, according to latest reports, will be an assembly car with seats around the sides, with a radio and phonograph installed. Candy and pop soda will be sold on the train.

The Special leaves San Jose at 2:15, arriving in Stockton at 4:30. It leaves Pacific promptly at 12 midnight, rally officials said.

Tickets, selling for \$1.65 at the controller's office in the Student Union, are good for ten days, rally officials said.

On arriving at Pacific, Sparta will stage a 10-block noise parade to Hunter's Square where a short rally will be held. Here, local rooters will be officially welcomed by the mayor, according to the rally committee.

Rooters will cruise the town in cars driven by COP supporters.

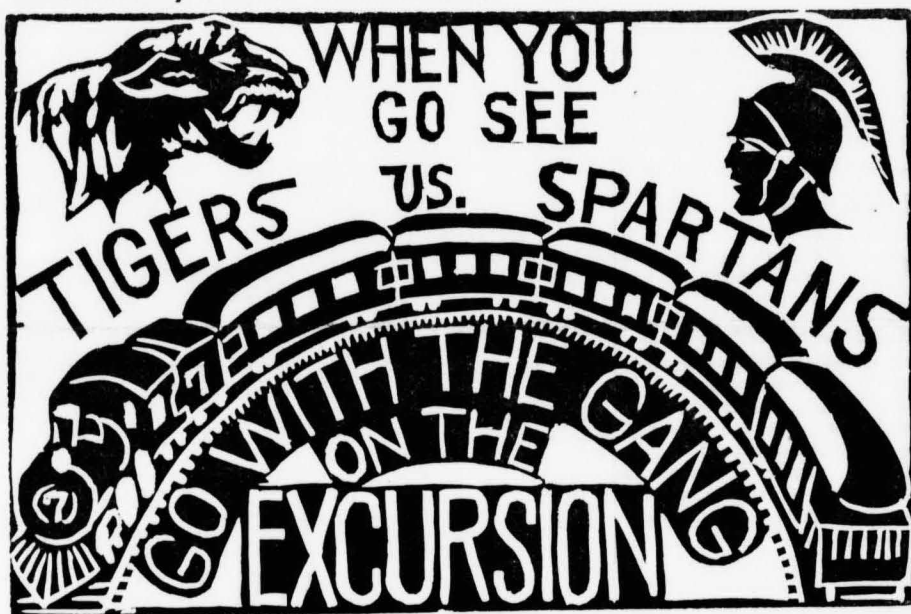

Performing on the two-hour show prepared under the direction of Happy LaBee, rally chairman, and emceed by Len Baskin, was a host of campus entertainers, augmented by the appearance of Ham Briggs, Stockton head yell leader, and Earl Sapiro, Pacific rally chairman.

Among hits of the show were Sal Rizzuto's impersonation of Lew Lehr's "Red Riding Hood" and piano numbers by Manuel, San Jose State college Alec Templeton.

ROOTER'S CAP ULTIMATUM ISSUED

Mascot Vs. Teacher In 'Battle Of Century'

Headlines in the sports page of a Chicago newspaper back in 1907 were publicizing the battle of the season between two mighty football elevens, as two pioneers of American football faced each other across the gridiron.

OPPOSITION

On one bench, with his undefeated University of Chicago team, sat Amos Alonzo Stagg as head coach. Right along side him sat his excited and over-anxious mascot, Dudley S. DeGroot. On the opposite side sat Glen S. Warner, with his band of Carlisle Indians.

The result of that game is history today; but history that will never be forgotten. "Pop" Warner's Indians and his Warner system completely humbled (Double A) Stagg and blew sky-high his dream of an undefeated season.

NEW SET-UP

This week once again the headlines blast out the "battle of a century" story between the two famous coaches. The only difference finds the mascot, Dud DeGroot, sitting on one bench as head man, with "Pop", his advisory coach, facing Amos Alonzo Stagg across the gridiron.

This will be the situation when San Jose State college and College of Pacific, two undefeated teams, battle it out in Baxter Stadium on Friday night.

The damage done here probably didn't amount to a great deal—less than twenty-five dollars in all. The real damage will come if we show ourselves weak-minded enough to attempt reprisals. I hope no one on this campus or connected with it will so far forget himself as to invade the Pacific campus.

If we cannot maintain a fine spirit of sportsmanship in our relations with other colleges, if we cannot manage our affairs in such a manner as to limit the efforts of the hoodlums, we should not have intercollegiate athletic relations. I hope every student on this campus will make an effort to keep our relations with Pacific on the very highest possible plane. If someone made them appear wrong this time, that is no reason why we should follow that example.

"SANTA MONICA, Calif.—Our San Jose State football team has caused the great majority of southern California sports editors to sit up and take notice of what Pop Warner and Dud DeGroot are doing in the way of coaching a class AA football through a tough 13-game schedule.

"Right now, there is quite a little copy being written about the coming San Jose-College of Pacific game this Friday night. The southern sports writers have awakened to the fact that this Warner-Stagg affair is really a grid gigantic and they are treating it as such.

"The fact that San Jose is at present leading the nation in the little matter of high scoring has in itself caused no end of talk, and not only in the papers either. I have talked with many people right here in Santa Monica who are following the Spartan games with avid interest.

"The space given to San Jose has decreased since the 'Terrible Trojans' finally got on their war horse, but one Sunday, the Los Angeles Times had an eight column banner about one of the San Jose's victories, and nearly an entire column about the game.

"The sports editors in their columns have also brought the activities of the Spartans before the public view, and the wire story about the Spartan boxers leaving for Japan received a little space.

"So it isn't only the papers in the northern part of the state that are giving the Spartans the break they justly deserve.

"Without the slightest doubt there will be a large crowd in Gilmore Stadium on November 17 to watch San Jose play Loyola, particularly if the Warnermen slap down those pesky Tigers.

"So here's hoping for a Spartan win on Friday night. Good luck."

Frosh Grididders Rest For Saint Mary's Game

Having completed their hardest practice this season on Tuesday night, Coach "Tiny" Hartranft's frosh football eleven will taper off this afternoon in preparation for Saturday night's clash with the St. Mary's freshmen. The opening kickoff is slated for 8 o'clock on the Spartan Stadium gridiron.

GOOD SHAPE

Fundamentals and defensive drills were emphasized in the final practice last night. Coach Hartranft stated that the yearlings are looking better each night and should be in their best shape of the season again St. Mary's.

As the frosh-Moraga tilt is the only gridiron battle in San Jose and surrounding territory Saturday evening, Physical Education officials expect a record turnout. This is the first time this year that the frosh team has had a game of their own on home grounds and they are expected to turn in their best exhibition yet.

MICHAELIS OUT

There will be no changes in the regular starting lineups with the exception of the left end spot, where injuries have forced the regular wingman, Michaelis, to the sidelines.

After tasting the first scoring blood, the Spartans were harder to stop and came back a few minutes later to add another goal to the total, putting the score at 2-0 where it remained until the end of the game. Ray Fahn, playing center forward, again gave the final kick.

The first half was fairly even, neither team being able to get very far into offensive territory. However, in the third quarter the Spartans' passes started clicking and most of the play was in Menlo territory, although they failed to come through with a score.

The starting line-up included Rother, Kotta, Fahn, Masdeo, and Albright in the front line; O'Conner, Dwyer, and Horrall in the half-back line, Anderson and Captain Hodgson at fulls, and Hill in the goal. The only two substitutions were Rocchi and Figone, both in the front line.

Sparta's band will spell out "Stagg" in letters eight feet by five, using 172 flares, in tribute to his fiftieth anniversary of coaching, Friday night at the C.O.P. game, according to Rube Tuttle, band publicity head.

In addition, they plan to do two other novel stunts, he also announced. The main feature is for the band to march en masse through a paper banner stretched between the goal posts, to symbolize how DeGroot's Spartans have marched through all opposition so far this season.

"Pop" will also be spelled out in the same manner as "Stagg". This formation will take place when the musicians salute the rival rooting section.

The band is traveling to Stockton on the excursion train and they will lead the noise parade to Hunter's Square.
