EMERGENCY MEASURES INVOKED FOR WAR CHEST

Total conscription of organizations and student officials was demanded by ASB President Milo Badger yesterday at an emergency session of the Student Council. Every campus organization and every class officer, as well as various college departments, will be enlisted to shake San Jose State College out of its stupor and put it over the hump in the War Chest campaign. The war is over, it is conceded, yet war's aftermath often is as horrible as the actual conflict. Civilians are still dying in all the blitz-torn countries of the world as a result of privations and suffering endured through long years of fighting, occupation, and oppression. They will continue to die in appalling numbers during the winter, with its months of famine and pestilence.

IMPROVED FROSH DOWN SALINAS 13-0

The San Jose State Freshman football team won its first game of the season Friday night when it soundly defeated Salinas J. C. 13 to 0.

It was the Spartans all the way as Coach Bill Hubbard's men outclassed the Panthers from the opening kickoff.

After a fumble set them back early in the game, the Spartans picked up late in the initial quarter and drove some 60-odd yards to the Salinas five-yard marker. On the third play of the second quarter Archie Chagonjian smashed over tackle from two yards out to score State's first touchdown. Pete Denevi's attempted conversion was blocked.

The Panthers had a chance late in the second quarter to tie the count as they recovered a State fumble deep in Spartan territory. They drove to about the State ten-yard line, but the half ended with Salinas still short of the Spartan goal line.

This was the only threat the Panthers made all evening playing most of the time in their own territory.

The second half was all State, as they twice drove within the Salinas 15-yard line only to be held on downs. One drive was stopped on the Panther nine-yard line by a backfield in motion penalty.

The fourth quarter score by the Spartans was set up when Davilla, State quarterback, intercepted a Salinas pass on the Panther 40-yard line and returned it to their 30. The Spartans then drove to the Salinas 17-yard line but were held when Stevenson's pass fell incomplete in the end zone.

With Salinas now deep in their own territory they went back to punt. Center and line backer-up Bud Hooton, and end Jack Bolton charged in to smother the Panther punt. It rolled crazily into the end zone where Hooton fell on it for the second State touchdown. This time Denevi's conversion split the uprights and the score stood 13-0 State.

The Spartans had nine first downs to four for Salinas, and gained 134 yards from scrimmage to 70 for the Panthers.

Display Features 'Fix It Yourself'

is our responsibility, even our destiny, to ease the suffering of those peoples through whatever means we have at hand. That means is the War Chest.

San Jose State has failed in its responsibility, or will have failed if student contributions between now and Friday do not treble those of the first eight days of the drive.

"It is not too late to pull this campaign out of the mudflats of indifference," declares Dean of Men Paul Pitman. "At the Kasserine Pass, green, ill-prepared American troops were defeated by Rommel. But those same men reformed their lines and came thundering back to drive the Afrika Korps into the sea."

"We may not make the quota," Dean Pitman concedes, "but if we go down, we'll go down with our flags flying. Even the downtown papers will know that the State campaign has been struck by an atomic bomb."

RALLY FOR GAME WITH HOLLISTER

An overwhelming display of the spirit of Sparta is expected at the rally tomorrow at 12:30 in the quad for the return game with Hollister.

The rally will feature introduction of first string players by either Coach Wilbur Hubbard or Dan Weck, manager. Yells will be led by Ken McGill and Al Johnson. The San Jose State college band will play under the direction of Mr. Thomas Eagan.

Members of the Rally committee, wearing official arm bands, will be at the stadium at 7 o'clock tomorrow night to rope off the rooting section. Only those members of the student body who wear white shirts or sweaters and rooters' caps will be allowed to sit in the rooting section.

No card tricks will be ready for the Hollister game, but the committee plans to have them ready for the next home game.

"The first home game should mean a really good turnout at both the rally and the game," said Irene Hull, Rally committee chairman. "I hope everyone remembers to wear white shirts to the game."

'Sparks At Sparta'

Somebody dropped a spark into the tinder box of associated student body government last Friday. It came in the form of a letter to be read at an extraordinary session of the council. "As we come toward the end of the Chest campaign, it is becoming painfully evident that something is very wrong," the letter said. Up to last Thursday, the per capita contribution amounted to only one fourth what it had been for the previous three years.

Thirty cents per student is the average contribution now, while, if the assigned total of \$2500 is to be attained, each Spartan's contribution should average over a dollar.

The students paid 50 cents apiece to see the Hollister football game. It's not that we haven't the money.

Well, where can we contact the people who haven't given, and get across to them the need? We can reach some of them in classes if we send "minute men" around to tell them. A mammoth rally will help. We will check every member of every organization on campus. We will tell them that State has no such record for failure and doesn't intend to let this drive dog down. We'll turn the campus upside down, but we'll contact every loyal Spartan with a dollar in his purse, and leave him with 25 cents for lunch.
