## Ten Week Session Planned, Registrar West Announces

"A ten week summer session will be offered next year besides the usual six week session," announces Joe West, registrar.

Both the six and ten week sessions will begin on June 30, the former ending on August 8, the latter on September 5. The post session will probably be held from August 11 to August 29.

The six week session will cater primarily to school teachers, whereas the 10 week one will be principally for regular students. A maximum of 15 units will be offered in the 10 week term.

"The need for the 10 week session has developed primarily because of the large number of veterans who wish to attend school continuously until graduation," West stated.

## SPARTAN JAYVEES MEET SANTA CRUZ SEAHAWKS

From all indications, the JayVee squad will run into its toughest competition of the 1946 schedule tomorrow night when they tangle with the American Legion Seahawks on the Santa Cruz high school turf at 8 p. m.

The Seahawks boast an impressive record with victories over the St. Mary's reserves and the Fresno State junior varsity. They defeated

the baby Gaels 20-6, and came through with a 7-0 win over the rugged Bulldog reserves. Only blemish on the Legion record is a 6-0 loss to the powerful Santa Clara JayVees.

Break-a-way artist, Sid Carter, is the number one Seahawk threat. Carter, an ex-Santa Cruz prep star and Salinas junior college griddier, also starred for the powerful Barber's Point eleven in the Central Pacific Area League in the Hawaiian Islands during the war.

Jack Rittenhouse, Seahawk tackle, has a personal interest in the game, for Bob Rittenhouse, Spartan fullback, is his cousin. Another strong spot in the Santa Cruz line is Theron Fought who handles the right end assignments. Fought formerly played for JayVee coach Winter at Salinas junior college, and was one of the outstanding wingmen in J. C. football in 1939.

Mammoth Bob Dalman, 247-pound Seahawk tackle, is a fine defensive player, and very agile for his size. Practically every member of the Santa Cruz Seahawk eleven has had at least four years of pigskin experience.

Coach of the Santa Cruz Seahawks is Bradley Lynn, former Notre Dame and California Poly football star. Coach Lynn has molded the Seahawks from a me-

Coach Bill Hubbard and the Spartans were given a rousing send-off last night in Morris Dailey auditorium by a capacity crowd of Spartans. The Idaho encounter is an important one for the Gold and White eleven who now hold a season record of one win, one loss, and one tie.

## DR. GAYLE PICKWELL RETIRES FROM SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The retirement of Dr. Gayle B. Pickwell, professor of zoology and an internationally known ornithologist and naturalist has been announced by Dr. P. Victor Peterson, Science department head.

Dr. Peterson also announced that Miss Emily Smith, teacher of

nature study since 1931, has taken a year's leave of absence.

Dr. Pickwell came to San Jose in 1927 from Cornell university where he obtained his Ph.D. degree. His thesis was entitled "Prairie Horned Lark," and was published by the St. Louis Academy of Sciences.

Dr. Pickwell was greatly assisted in his work at San Jose by Miss Smith who collaborated with him on many of his works.

They spent several years in developing and pioneering the West Coast School of Nature Study which was started here in the early Thirties.

Miss Smith also collaborated with the noted naturalist on his series of nature books, some of which were "Birds," "Weather," "Deserts," and "Insects."

His new book entitled "Amphibians and Reptiles of the Pacific States" is now being published by the Stanford University Press, and will be ready early in 1947.

Dr. Pickwell is also now revising his film strip which contains a series of 35 feet film on birds and plant life.

## TRACK ACE OK

Coach Bud Winter announced today that Richard Vierra, his ace cross-country and two-mile man, is out of danger following an injury suffered yesterday while practicing on the San Jose State cross-country course near Spartan Stadium.

Vierra, National J. C. two-mile champ from Visalia Junior college, received a cut over his right eye that required nine stitches to close in addition to minor cuts and bruises when he fell into a barbed wire fence east of the Spartan practice field.

Winter reported today after a short visit with the distance man at McFadden Health cottage that, "he is resting easily and wants to get out and get going again."

Vierra is under the care of Dr. Felita Williams of the college department.

### Petrillo Announces Wage Increase

CHICAGO—James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians (AFL), announced last night that an agreement had been reached with industry members for a 37½ per cent wage increase for musicians making recordings.

### Careless Thief Robs Wally

LONDON—Jewels valued at \$1,000,000 were stolen from the Duchess of Windsor yesterday. Nearly \$120,000 worth has been recovered on the lawn of the estate where they were dropped by the fleeing thief.

### Ceilings to be Off by November 1

WASHINGTON—Price controls came off coffee yesterday, and OPA officials said ceilings on almost all other major foods, commodities and services, probably will be removed by November 1.

### Atom Bomb Causes Cancer

CLEVELAND—Many survivors of the Atomic bomb attacks on Japan will develop cancer within the next 10 to 15 years, Col. Ashley W. Oughterson, director of the American Cancer Society, Inc., said last night.

"Burns from Gamma rays of the Atomic bombs will leave scar tissue which will lead to cancer in many cases over the next 10 years."
