## Action Urged

# Lack of Interest At Housing Rally

They sat waiting . . . waiting for the housing rally, but it never did materialize.

Instead, only 20 students showed up for the "non rally" on Seventh Street Friday to hear Earl Hansen, student ombudsman, and Joel Fritsche, housing committee member explain the housing crisis at SJS and alternatives to the problem.

The scant group of onlookers heard Hansen urge students to use the microphone to express housing grievances and ideas for a solution. No one approached the mike.

"I've heard our age group called the 'pepsi generation,' but all we've got at SJS is fizz," Hansen said.

"It's your money," Fritsche asserted. "Do with it what you want, but I know what I'll do with mine."

"No change can be brought about, unless they get involved, partake in a dialogue and express their opinions," Hansen said, referring to apathetic students.

Hansen and Fritsche did outline steps which can be taken to

rectify unsanitary conditions, health hazards, damage deposits never returned, and broken verbal and written contracts with landlords.

Individual cases have been corrected by calling on the landlords, or calling in the health and fire departments, according to Hansen.

A \$2 fee is required to file suits in the small claims court against landlords, Hansen indicated. ASB Vice President Bill Langan has filed suit against his landlord, and Hansen feels this may stand as a trial case.

Fritsche called for a united force to alert the community to "what's happening." These landlords are cheating 25,000 students every year and making thousands of dollars, according to Fritsche.

"If we can unite, we can bring these people to their knees," he concluded.

A large turn-out is expected as Unruh's visit seems to have rekindled the political spirits of many Kennedy and McCarthy sup-

porters who went into seclusion after the Chicago convention.

Dorm, Greek, and independent students, co-ordinated by ASB Vice President Bill Langan, have painted colorful signs and banners,

After the speech, Unruh is expected to set out on a cross-cam-

pus walk toward Tower Hall and the fountain area where he will chat with ASB President Dick Miner and college President Robert D. Clark.

## NEWS CONFERENCE

Students scratched plans for a noon airport rally and motorcade when it was learned the assemblyman would have to rush from the airport for a news conference at either Station KNTV — Channel 11, or the San Jose Mercury-News.

Unruh's speech, tentatively scheduled to hit on the role of colleges and universities in our society, underwent a last minute change.

The new topic will find the Inglewood assemblyman lashing out at the state's present scheme of priority spending and how it has affected all Californians, "including students at SJS."

## STEP UP ATTACKS

According to aides, John Vasconcellos (Dem.-24th Dist.) and Marc Poche (Dem.-25th Dist.) will accompany the Speaker.

Lately Unruh has stepped-up his attacks on the Johnson administration. Before 2,000 students last week in Los Angeles, he accused the administration of misleading America on the Vietnam war.

"I intend to tell it like it is," said Unruh. He charged that the American people have been "consistently and categorically misled" about the progress of the war and its purposes.

## MASC Rally

# Chicanos Support Students In Riot-Torn Mexico City

"You talk about communists in Cuba. You talk about communists in Vietnam, but you don't give a ---- about your neighbor," shouted Humberto Garza, SJS member of Mexican-American Student Confederation (MASC).

Garza lashed out at Americans and the Mexican government Friday morning at a MASC rally on Seventh Street.

The rally was held on campus in support of the student insurrectionists in Mexico City who are attempting to disrupt the Olympic games which began Saturday.

Immediately following the rally, MASC members drove to San Francisco where they staged a vigil in front of the Mexican Consulate in conjunction with other Chicano groups in the Bay Area.

## ONLY SPEAKER

Garza was the primary speaker at the rally and said, "It is absurd for the Mexican government to spend millions of dollars to accommodate foreigners when Mexico doesn't even have enough hospitals, food, doctors or roads for their own people."

Bill Calhoun, member of United Black Students for Action at SJS spoke in support of the Chicano students.

"I recently had the opportunity to speak with Brother Harry Edwards, who was the organizer of the Black Olympic boycott."

"Brother Edwards and I feel sorrow, shame and loss of pride. There is no possible way that the position taken by Black athletes at the Olympic games can be justified. They have put themselves above the masses for some honky gold medal that some cracker will give them for running."

## NO HONOR

"There is no honor in any gold medals we win. White European and White American capitalists are giving those niggers gold medals. They are traitors to their race. Black Power!"

"We applaud the revolutionary

effort of the students in Mexico City," said Calhoun.

Garza summed up MASC's position by saying, "This is an exploitation of poor people to satisfy your needs and your high standards of living."

"Every athlete who gets a gold medal should know that 10,000 babies die every year, because they don't have enough milk."

"It will be a long, lonely fight, but as long as people care, it can be done, it has to be done," concluded Garza.

Approximately 100 students attended the rally. The majority were Chicano or Black with a sprinkling of White students observing.

In response to Malik Abdullah's "No Oil Kings" in the Spartan Daily of Oct. 10, I have a few comments to make.

First of all, the number of foreign students at SJS is 10 times greater than he states. Regarding the "benefits" for the amount of fees paid, I must say that Mr. Abdullah is not well informed. It may be interesting for him to know that the State pays more than \$2,000 for each student per year. The opportunities and facilities offered weigh several times more than what we pay for.

I, myself, am a foreign student. Needless to say, most of us are not the "sons of oil kings," and some of us have to work our way through school. We must not forget, however, that the school authorities do make the student aware of this situation before he leaves his country, and it is thoroughly ascertained that he can meet his financial needs here.

Regarding the ASB responsibilities toward foreign students, I should mention for Mr. Abdullah's information that every year the ASB appoints an Intercultural Steering Committee, and a sum of \$3,600 is allotted for activities for foreign students. This consists of programs through this committee, International Students Organization, and International Students Center.

There is no reason for any student at SJS to be "lonely and lonesome." We can achieve this by participating in activities, which are countless in number. American students and the community are eager to meet us, and know about our cultures, as much as we were to learn about American culture before coming to the United States.

## Winning Football Games, No Measure of Dignity

Winning football games is no longer the primary criterion for measuring the dignity of the acutely aware student body attending SJS, but losing year after year by scores like 46-0, 68-0 and 68-20, does have an effect.

Students and athletes are tired of being humiliated. How long can a fan rationalize his plight by saying, "Look at the schedule we play?"

Major collegiate football is big business, and just like a business, competition is keen. SJS should decide now if it is willing to pay the price necessary to compete against schools like Stanford, Arizona State, and California.

If the school is not willing to go all the way and give the athletic program the money it needs, let's make do with what

we have and schedule more games instead of slaughters.

Fresno State, even if it is a small school, provided the most exciting football game of the season for SJS. The student body showed some spirit and had a good time at the Fresno game. Isn't that what a good football program should accomplish?

Sure SJS footballers receive some financial aid, but how can SJS teams expect to compete with a school like Stanford? Stanford athletes receive over \$2,000 per year in financial aid, while SJS players receive about \$800.

At SJS athletes receive only \$77.91 per month to cover living expenses; even San Diego State gives its athletes \$100 per month.

It is surprising that the recruiting program at State has done as well as it has, considering what the school can offer.

Too many good athletes have found football financially infeasible. Some of these such as Don Rose and Fred Luke found it in their best interests to do other things.

Not only the players but the coaching staff suffer from insufficient funds. It would be interesting to compare the salaries of SJS coaches to the salaries of their opponents. Good coaches are usually drawn to where the money is.

The potential is there for SJS to be successful as a large scale football power. The question, is it worth it? Let's have football games instead of slaughters on Saturday afternoons.

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**Rev. Emmel Leaves**

A 12-year veteran of SJS, the Rev. Donald Emmel, senior pastor of the United Campus Christian Ministry (UCCM), will be leaving for a new position in Hartford, Conn. in two weeks.

The Rev. Emmel will become associate pastor in charge of education for high school students through adults at the Westminster Presbyterian Church.

Pastor Emmel became the first Presbyterian minister at SJS in 1956, and established the first full time Protestant denominational ministry here.

Comparing the Christian ministry on the campus now to when he first arrived, the Rev. Emmel said, "There was a great deal of Christian ministry then, primarily through the student YMCA and YWCA, and in some ways, there was more then than there is now."

He did admit, however, that a probable reason for the ministry being more effective then was because the campus was considerably smaller.

The UCCM was formed in 1959 when the Presbyterian, Congregationalist and Disciples of Christ college-age groups merged, naming the Rev. Emmel as senior pastor. This semester, the UCCM joined with the Methodist-sponsored Wesley Foundation.

The first UCCM structure was a "turn-of-the-century" style building at 99 S. 11th St. A few years later, the UCCM moved into a similar building on Fifth Street, and then finally into an old struc-

All students have been invited to attend the meeting every other Tuesday from 8-9:30 p.m. in the dormitory.

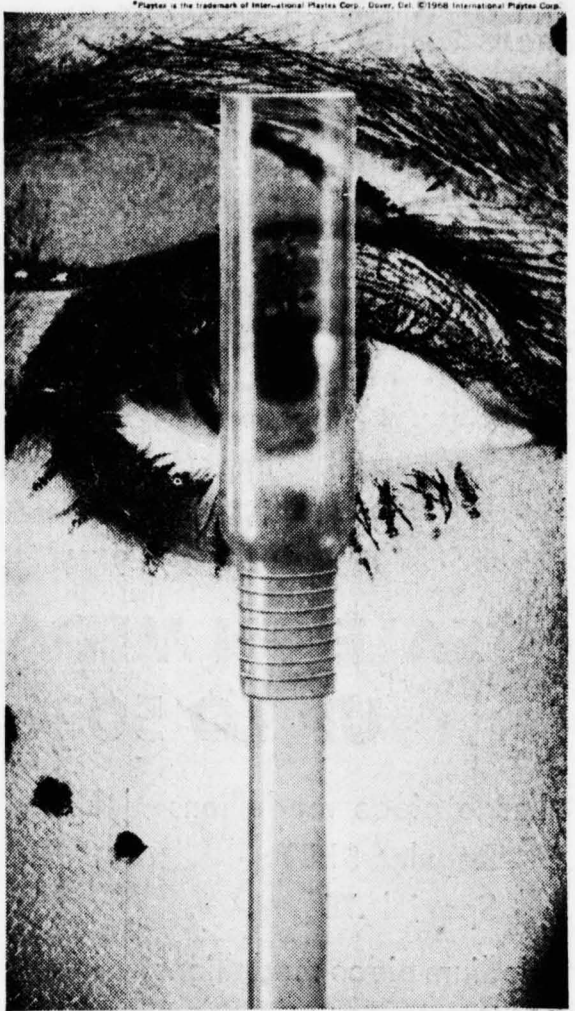
